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# Methodology | Florida 2019

Club for Growth Foundation publishes the scorecard study so the public can be educated and informed about the voting record of Florida's elected state lawmakers on economic growth issues.

The Foundation conducted a comprehensive examination of each lawmaker's record on votes related to pro-growth policies and computed an Economic Growth Score on a scale of 0 to 100. A score of 100 would indicate the highest support for pro-growth policies.

**The Foundation examined legislative votes related to the Foundation's immediate pro-economic growth policy goals, including:**

- Reducing or eliminating tax rates and enacting tax reform
- Limited government through limited spending and budget reform
- Regulatory reform and deregulation
- Ending abusive lawsuits through medical malpractice and tort reform
- Expanding school choice
- Implementing Term Limits

Not all of these policy goals will come up for a vote in each legislative session.

The Foundation also examined votes on bills that would directly harm these goals.

This scorecard is based on selected votes of importance to the Foundation, and does not include the complete voting record of any legislator. There are inherent limitations in judging the overall qualifications of any legislator based on a selected voting record, and the Foundation does not endorse or oppose any legislator for public office.

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## LEGISLATIVE ACTIONS CONSIDERED IN FLORIDA IN 2019

The Foundation’s study examined over 600 floor votes and, ultimately, included 15 Florida House votes and 13 Florida Senate votes.

### COMPUTATION

Scores are computed on a scale of 0 to 100. Each vote or action in the rating is assigned a certain number of points depending on its relative importance. If a lawmaker casts a correct vote, the scorecard will denote it with that number. If a lawmaker casts an incorrect vote, the scorecard will denote that vote with a hyphen (-). Absences are not counted – signified as an “X” on the scorecard – though the Foundation reserves the right to do so if, in its judgment, a lawmaker’s position was otherwise discernible.

To provide some additional guidance concerning the scores, each lawmaker was ranked. Lawmakers with 0% scores are, by

default, ranked #116 in the Florida House and #38 in the Florida Senate. Scores and ranks cannot be directly compared between the House and Senate, as different votes were taken in each chamber. If applicable, the study also records a “Lifetime Score” for each lawmaker. This is a simple average of the scores from 2019 and all previous years where the lawmaker earned a score.

In some cases, a lawmaker was not present for enough votes for a meaningful score or ranking to be computed. In such cases “n.a.” for not applicable appears. In computing lifetime scores, years with “n.a.” listed instead of a score are not included. Comparing such scores to other members without “n.a.” years may be misleading.

### ADDITIONAL FACTORS

A study of roll call votes on the floor of the Florida House and the Florida Senate and legislative actions is just that. It cannot account for a lawmaker’s work in committee, advocacy in their party’s caucus meetings, and effectiveness as a leader in advocating pro-growth policies.

# Florida 2019 | Senate Vote Descriptions

## HB 7

### DIRECT PRIMARY CARE AGREEMENTS (CFGF SUPPORTS)

This bill would expand the scope of “direct primary care agreements” which permit a physician to charge a monthly fee to patients for routine services outside the scope of insurance. The Florida House passed this bill on March 27, 2019, by a vote of 90-24. The Florida Senate passed it, 40-0, on May 2, 2019.

## HB 9

### AGENCY ACCOUNTABILITY (CFGF SUPPORTS)

This bill would enact fiscal reform measures for community redevelopment agencies to make them more transparent and accountable. The Florida Senate passed this bill, 36-1, on May 1, 2019. The Florida House passed it, 81-30, on May 2, 2019.

## HB 21

### REPEAL OF CERTIFICATE OF NEED (CFGF SUPPORTS)

This bill would eliminate Certificate of Need requirements statewide for hospitals and healthcare providers. The Florida Senate passed the bill, 23-17, on April 29, 2019. The Florida House passed it, 81-34, on the same day.

## HB 829

### RESTRAINING OVERZEALOUS LOCAL GOVERNMENTS (CFGF SUPPORTS)

This bill would award attorney fees and costs to the plaintiff in actions aimed at clarifying local government regulations unless the local government is given 21 days notice to repeal the law. The Florida Senate passed the bill, 25-14, on May 1, 2019. The Florida House passed it, 77-31, on May 2, 2019.

## HB 843

### DENTAL STUDENT LOAN SUBSIDIES (CFGF OPPOSES)

This bill would encourage dentists to relocate to rural areas of Florida in exchange for getting up to \$50,000 a year of their school loans paid off by the state. The Florida Senate passed this bill, 39-0, on April 29, 2019. The Florida House passed it, 115-0, on the same day.

## HB 1113

### SHARED SAVINGS PROGRAMS (CFGF SUPPORTS)

This bill creates the Patient Savings Act, which would allow health insurers to create a voluntary program that incentivizes consumers to shop around for prescription drugs and services, the savings of which would be shared between the insurer and the insured. The Florida House passed this bill, 105-2, on May 3, 2019. The Florida Senate passed it, 37-1, on the same day.

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### HB 7065

#### ASSIGNMENT OF BENEFITS REFORM (CFGF SUPPORTS)

This bill implemented several insurance reforms, including allowing insurance companies to offer policies that prohibit assignment of benefits, to enable more consumer choice. The Florida House passed this bill, 96-20, on April 11, 2019. The Florida Senate passed it, 25-14, on April 24, 2019.

### SB 82

#### VEGETABLE GARDENS (CFGF SUPPORTS)

This bill would prohibit local governments from regulating vegetable gardens on residential properties. The Florida Senate passed this bill, 35-5, on March 21, 2019. The Florida House passed it, 93-16, on May 1, 2019.

### SB 178

#### VISIT FLORIDA CRONYISM (CFGF OPPOSES)

This bill would have prevented the scheduled repeal of Visit Florida, currently set for October

1, 2019. The Florida Senate passed the bill, 36-0, on April 17, 2019. The bill died in the Florida House.

### SB 596

#### REGIONAL RURAL DEVELOPMENT GRANTS (CFGF OPPOSES)

This bill would increase the amount of money that local economic development organizations can receive from a grant and decrease the matching requirement that organizations must get from non-government entities. The Florida Senate passed the bill, 38-0, on April 17, 2019. The bill died in the Florida House.

### SB 862

#### LESSOR LIABILITY REFORM (CFGF SUPPORTS)

This bill would protect lessors of special mobile equipment from liability in the event of injury, death, or damage if documented proof of sufficient insurance coverage is contained in the lease agreement. The Florida Senate passed this bill, 29-8, on April 25, 2019. The Florida House passed it, 83-32, on April 30, 2019.

### SB 1024

#### BLOCKCHAIN TECHNOLOGY (CFGF SUPPORTS)

This bill would establish the Florida Blockchain Task Force to study ways in which government can benefit from blockchain technology for such things as recordkeeping and security. The Florida Senate passed this bill, 39-0, on April 26, 2019. The Florida House passed it, 113-0, on May 1, 2019.

### S 7070

#### SCHOOL CHOICE (CFGF SUPPORTS)

This bill expands charter schools and school choice programs to provide families more educational options for their children. The Senate passed this bill, 23-17, on April 25, 2019. The House passed it, 76-39, on April 30, 2019.

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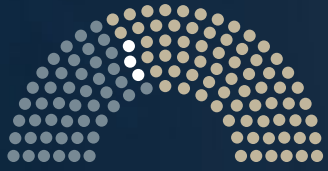

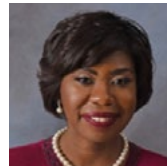

# Florida 2019 | House Vote Descriptions

## HB 7

### DIRECT PRIMARY CARE AGREEMENTS (CFGF SUPPORTS)

This bill would expand the scope of “direct primary care agreements” which permit a physician to charge a monthly fee to patients for routine services outside the scope of insurance. The Florida House passed this bill on March 27, 2019, by a vote of 90-24. The Florida Senate passed it, 40-0, on May 2, 2019.

## HB 9

### AGENCY ACCOUNTABILITY (CFGF SUPPORTS)

This bill would enact fiscal reform measures for community redevelopment agencies to make them more transparent and accountable. The Florida Senate passed this bill, 36-1, on May 1, 2019. The Florida House passed it, 81-30, on May 2, 2019.

## HB 15

### LOCAL GOVERNMENT ACCOUNTABILITY (CFGF SUPPORTS)

This bill requires more public notices and more public access about proposed tax increases and proposed debt issuances. The bill also tightens reporting requirements for certain economic development projects. The Florida House passed this bill, 111-3, on April 11, 2019. The bill died in the Florida Senate.

## HB 21

### REPEAL OF CERTIFICATE OF NEED (CFGF SUPPORTS)

This bill would eliminate Certificate of Need requirements statewide for hospitals and healthcare providers. The Florida Senate passed the bill, 23-17, on April 29, 2019. The Florida House passed it, 81-34, on the same day.

## HB 641

### SUPERMAJORITY VOTE FOR LOCAL BONDS (CFGF SUPPORTS)

This bill would require local community development districts to secure a two-thirds majority vote in order to issue debt backed by taxpayers. The Florida House passed this bill, 109-3, on April 11, 2019. The bill died in the Florida Senate.

## HB 791

### SPORTS FRANCHISE SUBSIDIES (CFGF SUPPORTS)

This bill would restrict the ability of government to provide sports-related subsidies. The Florida House passed this bill, 103-13, on April 11, 2019. The bill died in the Florida Senate.

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### HB 829

#### RESTRAINING OVERZEALOUS LOCAL GOVERNMENTS

##### (CFGF SUPPORTS)

This bill would award attorney fees and costs to the plaintiff in actions aimed at clarifying local government regulations unless the local government is given 21 days notice to repeal the law. The Florida Senate passed the bill, 25-14, on May 1, 2019. The Florida House passed it, 77-31, on May 2, 2019.

### HB 843

#### DENTAL STUDENT LOAN SUBSIDIES

##### (CFGF OPPOSES)

This bill would encourage dentists to relocate to rural areas of Florida in exchange for getting up to \$50,000 a year of their school loans paid off by the state. The Florida Senate passed this bill, 39-0, on April 29, 2019. The Florida House passed it, 115-0, on the same day.

### HB 955

#### WORK REQUIREMENTS FOR MEDICAID

##### (CFGF SUPPORTS)

This bill would submit a federal waiver seeking a work requirement for Medicaid recipients. The Florida House passed this bill, 71-44, on April 25, 2019. The bill died in the Florida Senate.

### HB 1113

#### SHARED SAVINGS PROGRAMS

##### (CFGF SUPPORTS)

This bill creates the Patient Savings Act, which would allow health insurers to create a voluntary program that incentivizes consumers to shop around for prescription drugs and services, the savings of which would be shared between the insurer and the insured. The Florida House passed this bill, 105-2, on May 3, 2019. The Florida Senate passed it, 37-1, on the same day.

### HB 7065

#### ASSIGNMENT OF BENEFITS REFORM

##### (CFGF SUPPORTS)

This bill implemented several insurance reforms, including allowing insurance companies to offer

policies that prohibit assignment of benefits, to enable more consumer choice. The Florida House passed this bill, 96-20, on April 11, 2019. The Florida Senate passed it, 25-14, on April 24, 2019.

### SB 82

#### VEGETABLE GARDENS

##### (CFGF SUPPORTS)

This bill would prohibit local governments from regulating vegetable gardens on residential properties. The Florida Senate passed this bill, 35-5, on March 21, 2019. The Florida House passed it, 93-16, on May 1, 2019.

### SB 862

#### LESSOR LIABILITY REFORM

##### (CFGF SUPPORTS)

This bill would protect lessors of special mobile equipment from liability in the event of injury, death, or damage if documented proof of sufficient insurance coverage is contained in the lease agreement. The Florida Senate passed this bill, 29-8, on April 25, 2019. The Florida House passed it, 83-32, on April 30, 2019.

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### SB 1024

#### BLOCKCHAIN TECHNOLOGY

##### (CFGF SUPPORTS)

This bill would establish the Florida Blockchain Task Force to study ways in which government can benefit from blockchain technology for such things as recordkeeping and security. The Florida Senate passed this bill, 39-0, on April 26, 2019. The Florida House passed it, 113-0, on May 1, 2019.

### S 7070

#### SCHOOL CHOICE

##### (CFGF SUPPORTS)

This bill expands charter schools and school choice programs to provide families more educational options for their children. The Senate passed this bill, 23-17, on April 25, 2019. The House passed it, 76-39, on April 30, 2019.

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
