Methodology | Tennessee 2019

Club for Growth Foundation publishes the scorecard study so the public can be educated and informed about the voting record of Tennessee's elected state lawmakers on economic growth issues.

The Foundation conducted a comprehensive examination of each lawmaker's record on votes related to pro-growth policies and computed an Economic Growth Score on a scale of 0 to 100. A score of 100 would indicate the highest support for pro-growth policies.

The Foundation examined legislative votes related to the Foundation's immediate pro-economic growth policy goals, including:

- Reducing or eliminating tax rates and enacting tax reform
- · Limited government through limited spending and budget reform
- Regulatory reform and deregulation
- Ending abusive lawsuits through medical malpractice and tort reform
- Expanding school choice
- Implementing Term Limits

Not all of these policy goals will come up for a vote in each legislative session.

The Foundation also examined votes on bills that would directly harm these goals.

This scorecard is based on selected votes of importance to the Foundation, and does not include the complete voting record of any legislator. There are inherent limitations in judging the overall qualifications of any legislator based on a selected voting record, and the Foundation does not endorse or oppose any legislator for public office.

LEGISLATIVE ACTIONS CONSIDERED IN **TENNESSEE IN 2019**

The Foundation's study examined over 4,600 floor votes and, in the end, included 14 Tennessee House votes and 14 Tennessee Senate votes.

COMPUTATION

Scores are computed on a scale of 0 to 100. Each vote or action in the rating is assigned a certain number of points depending on its relative importance. If a lawmaker casts a correct vote, the scorecard will denote it with that number. If a lawmaker casts an incorrect vote, the scorecard will denote that vote with a hyphen (-). Absences are not counted - signified as an "X" on the scorecard - though the Foundation reserves the right to do so if, in its judgment, a lawmaker's position was otherwise discernible. If a lawmaker was not officially sworn into office at the time of a vote, the scorecard will denote that vote with an "I".

To provide some additional guidance concerning the scores, each lawmaker was

ranked. Lawmakers with 0% scores are. by default, ranked #99 in the House and #33 in the Senate. If applicable, the study also records a "Lifetime Score" for each lawmaker. This is a simple average of the scores from 2019 and all previous years where the lawmaker earned a score.

In some cases, a lawmaker was not present for enough votes meaningful score or ranking to be computed. In such cases "n.a." for not applicable appears. In computing lifetime scores, years with "n.a." listed instead of a score are not included. Comparing such scores to other members without "n.a." years may be misleading.

ADDITIONAL FACTORS

A study of roll call votes on the floor of the Tennessee House and the Tennessee Senate and legislative actions is just that. It cannot account for a lawmaker's work in committee, advocacy in his party's caucus meetings, and effectiveness as a leader in advocating pro-growth policies.

Tennessee 2019 | Senate Vote Descriptions

HB 12

PROHIBIT BUSINESS LICENSING FOR MINORS

(CFGF SUPPORTS)

This bill prevents a local government from requiring a license, fee, permit or other form of regulation on certain businesses that are run by someone under the age of 18 years old. The Tennessee Senate passed this bill, 32-0, on April 1, 2019. The Tennessee House passed it, 93-0, on April 10, 2019.

HB 166

LOCAL BOND TRANSPARENCY

(CFGF SUPPORTS)

This bill would require all public entities, such as local governments, to publicly disclose when they issue or default on financial instruments like bonds or bank loans. The Tennessee House passed this bill, 97-0, on February 25, 2019. The Tennessee Senate passed it, 30-0, on February 28, 2019.

HB 377

RESTRICT "ROUND UP" PROGRAMS

(CFGF SUPPORTS)

Under current law, locally-owned utilities, municipal electric plants and other utilities in Tennessee are allowed to establish programs that "round up" a customer's bill to the next dollar, the proceeds of which go towards a variety of purposes. This law would require that all "round up" programs starting in 2021 are "opt-in" and that all current programs eventually transition to "opt-in" by the same date. The Tennessee House passed the bill, 81-14, on April 4, 2019. The Tennessee Senate passed it, 31-2, on May 1, 2019.

HB 597

HOTEL TAX FOR CORPORATE WELFARE (CFGF OPPOSES)

This bill would extend for six years the additional \$0.50 tax that Davidson County is allowed to charge on hotel rooms. The bill also allows the county to allocate the revenue to directly

promote tourism in the area. The Tennessee House passed the bill, 92-0, on April 22, 2019. The Tennessee Senate passed it. 32-0, on April 29, 2019.

HB 620

CORPORATE WELFARE WITHOUT STANDARDS

(CFGF OPPOSES)

This bill weakens the performance metrics for certain government subsidies. The Tennessee House passed this bill, 94-0, on April 30, 2019. The Tennessee Senate passed it, 31-0, on May 2, 2019.

HB 655

ALLOW BARTERING FOR HEALTHCARE SERVICES

(CFGF SUPPORTS)

This bill allows uninsured patients to pay for healthcare services by bartering goods or services with the healthcare provider. The

HB 667

ONLINE SALES TAX

(CFGF OPPOSES)

Due to a recent Supreme Court ruling, state governments can now enforce collection of sales taxes from remote retailers with no physical presence in their state. While the tax is already written into law, it hadn't been previously collected. This bill, with some exceptions, now makes that collection enforceable. The Tennessee House passed the bill, 85-7, on April 22, 2019. The Tennessee Senate passed it, 31-0, on April 29, 2019.

HB 939

EDUCATION SAVINGS ACCOUNTS

(CFGF SUPPORTS)

This bill provides low-income students in poorperforming school districts with education savings accounts, allowing them to transfer to better performing schools and provide

parents expanded school choice. The Tennessee House passed the bill, 51-46, on May 1, 2019. The Tennessee Senate passed it, 19-14, on the same day.

HB 1075

WINE AND GRAPE BUREAUCRACY

(CFGF OPPOSES)

This bill creates the Tennessee Wine and Grape Board, a new taxpayer-funded entity. The Tennessee Senate passed the bill, 26-0, on April 30, 2019. The Tennessee House passed it, 72-17, on the same day.

HB 1138

ENDING THE AMUSEMENT TAX

(CFGF SUPPORTS)

Tennessee's "Amusement Tax" is an additional tax on small gyms and health clubs that isn't universally applied to larger, competing fitness centers. This bill would repeal the tax on these small business owners. The Tennessee House passed this bill, 95-0, on March 21, 2019. The Tennessee Senate passed it, 29-1, on March 28, 2019.

HB 1262

ELIMINATE OCCUPATION TAXES

(CFGF SUPPORTS)

This bill eliminates the \$400 annual Professional Privilege Tax that is assessed on over a dozen different professions, saving taxpayers over \$22 million. The Tennessee House passed this bill. 84-0. on May 1, 2019. The Tennessee Senate passed it, 32-0, on the same day.

HB 1270

AUDIT TO REDUCE GOVERNMENT

(CFGF SUPPORTS)

This bill would require certain state agencies to conduct audits on how much federal funding impacts their budgets and how they would function in the absence of the federal funding. The Tennessee House passed the bill, 87-7, on March 18, 2019. The Tennessee Senate passed it, 32-0, on May 1, 2019.

HB 1280

BLOCK GRANT FOR MEDICAID

(CFGF SUPPORTS)

This bill directs the governor to seek a federal waiver that will allow Tennessee to receive a block grant for its Medicaid program, TennCare, to help control costs and give the state the flexibility to find innovative solutions to healthcare funding. The Tennessee House passed this bill, 63-19, on May 2, 2019. The Tennessee Senate passed it, 26-6, on the same day.

SB 1185

HAIR BRAIDING DEREGULATION

(CFGF SUPPORTS)

This bill exempts hair braiders from having to get a state license. It also greatly reduces the training hours needed - 16 hours, down from 300 - to operate in the state. The Tennessee Senate passed the bill, 27-5, on April 1, 2019. The Tennessee House passed it, 64-24, on April 8, 2019.

TENNESSEE HOUSE VOTE DESCRIPTIONS

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HB 12

PROHIBIT BUSINESS LICENSING FOR MINORS

(CFGF SUPPORTS)

This bill prevents a local government from requiring a license, fee, permit or other form of regulation on certain businesses that are run by someone under the age of 18 years old. The Tennessee Senate passed this bill, 32-0, on April 1, 2019. The Tennessee House passed it, 93-0, on April 10, 2019.

HB 166

LOCAL BOND TRANSPARENCY

(CFGF SUPPORTS)

This bill would require all public entities, such as local governments, to publicly disclose when they issue or default on financial instruments like bonds or bank loans. The Tennessee House passed this bill, 97-0, on February 25, 2019. The Tennessee Senate passed it, 30-0, on February 28, 2019.

HB 377

RESTRICT "ROUND UP" PROGRAMS

(CFGF SUPPORTS)

Under current law, locally-owned utilities, municipal electric plants and other utilities in Tennessee are allowed to establish programs that "round up" a customer's bill to the next dollar, the proceeds of which go towards a variety of purposes. This law would require that all "round up" programs starting in 2021 are "opt-in" and that all current programs eventually transition to "opt-in" by the same date. The Tennessee House passed the bill, 81-14, on April 4, 2019. The Tennessee Senate passed it, 31-2, on May 1, 2019.

HB 597

HOTEL TAX FOR CORPORATE WELFARE (CFGF OPPOSES)

This bill would extend for six years the additional \$0.50 tax that Davidson County is allowed to charge on hotel rooms. The bill also allows the county to allocate the revenue to directly

promote tourism in the area. The Tennessee House passed the bill, 92-0, on April 22, 2019. The Tennessee Senate passed it. 32-0, on April 29, 2019.

HB 620

CORPORATE WELFARE WITHOUT STANDARDS

(CFGF OPPOSES)

This bill weakens the performance metrics for certain government subsidies. The Tennessee House passed this bill, 94-0, on April 30, 2019. The Tennessee Senate passed it, 31-0, on May 2, 2019.

HB 655

ALLOW BARTERING FOR HEALTHCARE SERVICES

(CFGF SUPPORTS)

This bill allows uninsured patients to pay for healthcare services by bartering goods or services with the healthcare provider. The

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Tennessee House passed the bill, 82-6, on April 4. 2019. The Tennessee Senate passed it. 32-0. on April 15, 2019.

HB 667

ONLINE SALES TAX

(CFGF OPPOSES)

Due to a recent Supreme Court ruling, state governments can now enforce collection of sales taxes from remote retailers with no physical presence in their state. While the tax is already written into law, it hadn't been previously collected. This bill, with some exceptions, now makes that collection enforceable. The Tennessee House passed the bill, 85-7, on April 22, 2019. The Tennessee Senate passed it, 31-0, on April 29, 2019.

HB 939

EDUCATION SAVINGS ACCOUNTS

(CFGF SUPPORTS)

This bill provides low-income students in poorperforming school districts with education savings accounts, allowing them to transfer to better performing schools and provide

parents expanded school choice. The Tennessee House passed the bill, 51-46, on May 1, 2019. The Tennessee Senate passed it, 19-14, on the same day.

HB 1075

WINE AND GRAPE BUREAUCRACY

(CFGF OPPOSES)

This bill creates the Tennessee Wine and Grape Board, a new taxpayer-funded entity. The Tennessee Senate passed the bill, 26-0, on April 30, 2019. The Tennessee House passed it, 72-17, on the same day.

HB 1138

ENDING THE AMUSEMENT TAX

(CFGF SUPPORTS)

Tennessee's "Amusement Tax" is an additional tax on small gyms and health clubs that isn't universally applied to larger, competing fitness centers. This bill would repeal the tax on these small business owners. The Tennessee House passed this bill, 95-0, on March 21, 2019. The Tennessee Senate passed it, 29-1, on March 28, 2019.

HB 1262

ELIMINATE OCCUPATION TAXES

(CFGF SUPPORTS)

This bill eliminates the \$400 annual Professional Privilege Tax that is assessed on over a dozen different professions, saving taxpayers over \$22 million. The Tennessee House passed this bill. 84-0. on May 1, 2019. The Tennessee Senate passed it, 32-0, on the same day.

HB 1270

AUDIT TO REDUCE GOVERNMENT

(CFGF SUPPORTS)

This bill would require certain state agencies to conduct audits on how much federal funding impacts their budgets and how they would function in the absence of the federal funding. The Tennessee House passed the bill, 87-7, on March 18, 2019. The Tennessee Senate passed it, 32-0, on May 1, 2019.

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HB 1280

BLOCK GRANT FOR MEDICAID

(CFGF SUPPORTS)

This bill directs the governor to seek a federal waiver that will allow Tennessee to receive a block grant for its Medicaid program, TennCare, to help control costs and give the state the flexibility to find innovative solutions to healthcare funding. The Tennessee House passed this bill, 63-19, on May 2, 2019. The Tennessee Senate passed it, 26-6, on the same day.

SB 1185

HAIR BRAIDING DEREGULATION

(CFGF SUPPORTS)

This bill exempts hair braiders from having to get a state license. It also greatly reduces the training hours needed - 16 hours, down from 300 - to operate in the state. The Tennessee Senate passed the bill, 27-5, on April 1, 2019. The Tennessee House passed it, 64-24, on April 8. 2019.
