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# Methodology | Missouri 2019

Club for Growth Foundation publishes the scorecard study so the public can monitor the actions and the voting behavior of Missouri's elected state lawmakers on economic growth issues.

The Foundation conducted a comprehensive examination of each lawmaker's record on votes related to pro-growth policies and computed an Economic Growth Score on a scale of 0 to 100. A score of 100 indicates the highest support for pro-growth policies.

**The Foundation examines legislative votes related to the Club's immediate pro-economic growth policy goals, including:**

- Reducing or eliminating tax rates and enacting tax reform
- Limited government through limited spending and budget reform
- Regulatory reform and deregulation
- Ending abusive lawsuits through medical malpractice and tort reform
- Expanding school choice
- Implementing Term Limits

Not all of these policy goals will come up for a vote in each legislative session.

The Foundation also examines votes on bills that would directly harm these goals.

This scorecard is based on selected votes of importance to the Foundation, and does not include the complete voting record of any legislator. There are inherent limitations in judging the overall qualifications of any legislator based on a selected voting record, and the Foundation does not endorse or oppose any legislator for public office.

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# LEGISLATIVE ACTIONS CONSIDERED IN MISSOURI IN 2019

The Foundation’s study examined over 800 floor votes and, in the end, included 18 Missouri House votes and 14 Missouri Senate votes.

## COMPUTATION

Scores are computed on a scale of 0 to 100. Each vote or action in the rating is assigned a certain number of points depending on its relative importance. If a lawmaker casts a correct vote, the scorecard will denote it with that number. If a lawmaker casts an incorrect vote, the scorecard will denote that vote with a hyphen (-). Absences are not counted – signified as an “X” on the scorecard – though the Foundation reserves the right to do so if, in its judgment, a lawmaker’s position was otherwise discernible. If a lawmaker was not officially sworn into office at the time of a vote, the scorecard will denote that vote with an “I”.

To provide some additional guidance concerning the scores, each lawmaker was ranked. Lawmakers with 0% scores are, by default, ranked #163 in the

House and #34 in the Senate. Scores and ranks cannot be directly compared between the House and Senate, as different votes were taken in each chamber. If applicable, the study also records a “Lifetime Score” for each lawmaker. This is a simple average of the scores from 2019 and all previous years where the lawmaker earned a score.

In some cases, a lawmaker was not present for enough votes for a meaningful score or ranking to be computed. In such cases “n.a.” for not applicable appears. In computing lifetime scores, years with “n.a.” listed instead of a score are not included. Comparing such scores to other members without “n.a.” years may be misleading.

## ADDITIONAL FACTORS

A study of roll call votes on the floor of the Missouri House and the Missouri Senate and legislative actions is just that. It cannot account for a lawmaker’s work in committee, advocacy in his party’s caucus meetings, and effectiveness as a leader in advocating pro-growth policies.

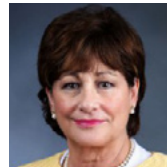

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## HB 677

### CORPORATE WELFARE FOR SPORTS TEAMS

**(CFGF OPPOSES)**

State and local governments are notorious for handing out subsidies to sports franchises, which in some cases come at considerable expense to taxpayers. This bill would authorize \$70 million in new subsidies to help pay for renovations to the St. Louis Blues' stadium. It would also authorize \$3 million more for the stadiums used by the Kansas City Royals and Kansas City Chiefs. The Missouri Senate passed this bill, 24-10, on May 9, 2019. The Missouri House passed it, 89-58 on May 15, 2019.

## SB 7

### PRO-GROWTH TORT REFORM

**(CFGF SUPPORTS)**

By reforming the state's venue and joinder laws, this bill cuts down on "venue shopping" - a method used by litigious lawyers to find courts that will give them the most favorable judgments.

The Missouri Senate passed this bill, 24-7, on March 4, 2019. The Missouri House passed it, 100-46, on May 1, 2019.

## SB 21

### LOCAL TAX HIKE AUTHORITY

**(CFGF OPPOSES)**

This bill would authorize certain localities to propose a tax increase in increments currently not allowed under law. This will likely encourage local governments to raise taxes when they otherwise wouldn't. The Missouri Senate passed the bill, 26-5, on February 21, 2019. The Missouri House passed it, 139-5, on May 15, 2019.

## SB 21

### EMERGENCY CLAUSE

**(CFGF OPPOSES)**

By declaring that a bill is "an emergency", the state legislature is able to help enact a bill into law sooner than is typically required. For SB 21, no real emergency existed, but for expediency, lawmakers used the emergency designation as

a legislative tool to push it through. A two-thirds vote is required in each chamber. The Missouri House passed this motion, 116-30, on May 15, 2019. The Missouri Senate passed this motion, 27-4, on February 21, 2019.

## SB 68

### SUBSIDIES FOR GENERAL MOTORS

**(CFGF OPPOSES)**

Corporate welfare has many negative consequences. It creates more bureaucracy, more lobbyists, more government spending - all at the expense of taxpayers - and it gives legislators the power to unfairly pick winners and losers in the marketplace. Among other things, this bill would authorize up to \$50 million in tax breaks for General Motors to expand its existing assembly plant in Wentzville, MO. It also contains a disturbing earmark for one particular company in Kansas City that could cost taxpayers over \$300 million. The Missouri House passed the bill, 92-51, on May 9, 2019. The Missouri Senate passed it, 25-8, on May 13, 2019.

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## Missouri 2019 | Senate Vote Descriptions

### SB 174

#### CLEANING UP THE TAX CODE

##### (CFGF SUPPORTS)

This act disallows the tax credit designed to compensate for the franchise tax. Missouri's law allows a tax credit for banking institutions to compensate for franchise taxes paid. The corporate franchise tax was repealed, for tax years beginning after January 1, 2020, so ending this tax credit will clean up the state's tax code and make it more equitable. The Missouri Senate passed this bill, 33-0, on April 4, 2019. The Missouri House passed it, 129-4, on May 16, 2019.

### SB 213

#### STATE DEMOGRAPHER

##### (CFGF SUPPORTS)

The newly created government position of state demographer was established in the Missouri Constitution by initiative petition. The demographer was not subject to ethics and conflict of interest provisions, financial transparency measures, and gift bans for the demographer and his/her family. This act ensures good governance by subjecting the

demographer to these rules as well as a two-year ban on becoming a lobbyist after the demographer leaves the position. The Missouri Senate passed it, 26-7, on March 28, 2019. The Missouri House passed it, 142-3, on May 16, 2019.

### SB 275

#### UNCONSTITUTIONAL MULTI-SUBJECT BILL

##### (CFGF OPPOSES)

The original purpose of Senate Bill 275 was relating to health care, but the final version of SB 275 included a broader list of subjects. The Missouri Constitution says in Article III, Section 23 that "No bill shall contain more than one subject which shall be clearly expressed in its title." SB 275 contains more than one subject and therefore has violated the state's constitution. The Missouri House passed this bill, 120-19, on May 17, 2019. The Missouri Senate passed, 30-2, on the same day.

### SB 333

#### HIGHER LOCAL TAXES

##### (CFGF OPPOSES)

This bill doubles the maximum tax rate from

0.25% to 0.50% that certain municipalities can propose to voters to pay for fire protection services. The Missouri Senate passed this bill, 26-5, on April 18, 2019. The Missouri House passed it, 103-41, on May 17, 2019.

### SB 358

#### SUBSIDIES FOR PSYCHIATRISTS

##### (CFGF OPPOSES)

This bill adds psychiatrists to the state's Health Professional Student Loan Repayment Program, which is a program designed to subsidize psychiatrists in certain areas of the state. The Missouri Senate passed this bill, 32-0, on March 28, 2019. The bill died in the Missouri House.

### SB 414

#### FEDERAL WAIVER FOR OBAMACARE

##### (CFGF SUPPORTS)

This act creates the "Missouri Health Insurance Innovation Task Force" with the purpose of soliciting concepts and making recommendations for an innovation waiver application under Obamacare. The task force would focus on improving access to health care, decreasing

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premiums, and increasing the number of carriers. The Missouri Senate passed this, 30-1, on April 18, 2019. The Missouri House passed it, 133-17, on May 16, 2019.

### SCR 10

#### AUDITING THE AUDITOR

##### (CFGF SUPPORTS)

This concurrent resolution authorizes the employment of an independent certified public accountant to perform an audit on the condition and performance of the accounts, functions, programs and management of the State Auditor's office. The independent C.P.A. shall provide a written report of his or her findings to the General Assembly, the Governor, and the State Auditor. The Missouri Senate passed this resolution, 31-0, on February 21, 2019. The resolution died in the Missouri House.

### SCR 14

#### MORE DEBT FOR HIGHWAYS

##### (CFGF OPPOSES)

This resolution authorizes and directs the state to issue \$301 million in new debt not backed by

dedicated revenue to pay for the construction and repair of 215 bridges in Missouri. The Missouri Senate passed this resolution, 26-7, on April 15, 2019. The Missouri House passed it, 107-31, on May 17, 2019.

### SJR 14

#### TERM LIMITS FOR STATEWIDE

##### OFFICEHOLDER

##### (CFGF SUPPORTS)

Missouri already has term limits for governor and state treasurer, but this resolution proposes that voters approve of term limits for all statewide officeholders, including lieutenant governor, secretary of state, state auditor, and the state attorney general. The Missouri Senate passed this resolution, 31-3, on April 16, 2019. The Missouri House passed it, 114-32, on May 17, 2019.

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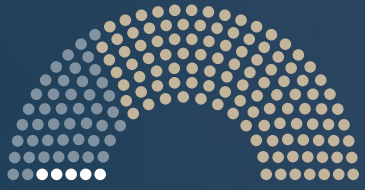

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## HB 255

### MISSOURI WORKS PROGRAM (CFGF OPPOSES)

This bill alters the Missouri Works Program so that state subsidies can be spent more quickly through a new “deal closing fund” that uses refundable and tradable tax credits. The Missouri House passed this bill, 136-20, on February 18, 2019. The bill died in the Missouri Senate.

## HB 326

### LICENSURE FOR MECHANICAL CONTRACTORS (CFGF OPPOSES)

This bill establishes the Missouri Statewide Mechanical Contractor Licensing Act. If passed, the statewide license for mechanical contractors would be regulated by the state and would require the creation of new levels of bureaucracy to sustain the licensing scheme. The Missouri House passed this bill, 101-44, on April 25, 2019. The bill died in the Missouri Senate.

## HB 404

### RETIRE IN MISSOURI FUND (CFGF OPPOSES)

This bill creates the Retirees Experiencing a Better Living (REBL) initiative that requires money from the state’s general revenue be placed in a separate fund to be used for marketing, promotional services, and creating new programs to encourage retirees to relocate to Missouri. The Missouri House failed to pass the bill, 67-85, on April 15, 2019.

## HB 410

### MORE HEALTHCARE FREEDOM (CFGF SUPPORTS)

This bill expanded healthcare freedom by changing the law so that physical therapists no longer need a prescription or referral from a doctor in order to treat a patient. The Missouri House passed this bill, 147-5, on March 14, 2019. The bill died in the Missouri Senate.

## HB 587

### REPEALING UNNECESSARY REGULATIONS (CFGF SUPPORTS)

This bill repeals Missouri’s Treated Timber Law, which unnecessarily regulates the treated wood industry. Repealing this law also includes ending the annual licensing fees paid by timber producers and dealers. The Missouri House passed this bill, 151-0, on March 7, 2019. The bill died in the Missouri Senate.

## HB 677

### CORPORATE WELFARE FOR SPORTS TEAMS (CFGF OPPOSES)

State and local governments are notorious for handing out subsidies to sports franchises, which in some cases come at considerable expense to taxpayers. This bill would authorize \$70 million in new subsidies to help pay for renovations to the St. Louis Blues’ stadium. It would also authorize \$3 million more for the stadiums used by the

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Kansas City Royals and Kansas City Chiefs. The Missouri Senate passed this bill, 24-10, on May 9, 2019. The Missouri House passed it, 89-58 on May 15, 2019.

### HB 762

#### ONLINE MUNICIPAL EXPENDITURES

**(CFGF SUPPORTS)**

Bringing accountability and sunshine to local governments, this bill would establish a searchable database accessible to the public that would show extensive information on how municipalities spend tax dollars. The Missouri House passed this bill, 85-65, on April 4, 2019. The bill died in the Missouri Senate.

### SB 7

#### PRO-GROWTH TORT REFORM

**(CFGF SUPPORTS)**

By reforming the state's venue and joinder laws, this bill cuts down on "venue shopping" - a method used by litigious lawyers to find courts that will give them the most favorable judgments. The Missouri Senate passed this bill, 24-7, on

March 4, 2019. The Missouri House passed it, 100-46, on May 1, 2019.

### SB 21

#### LOCAL TAX HIKE AUTHORITY

**(CFGF OPPOSES)**

This bill would authorize certain localities to propose a tax increase in increments currently not allowed under law. This will likely encourage local governments to raise taxes when they otherwise wouldn't. The Missouri Senate passed the bill, 26-5, on February 21, 2019. The Missouri House passed it, 139-5, on May 15, 2019.

### SB 21

#### EMERGENCY CLAUSE

**(CFGF OPPOSES)**

By declaring that a bill is "an emergency", the state legislature is able to help enact a bill into law sooner than is typically required. For SB 21, no real emergency existed, but for expediency, lawmakers used the emergency designation as a legislative tool to push it through. A two-thirds vote is required in each chamber. The Missouri

House passed this motion, 116-30, on May 15, 2019. The Missouri Senate passed this motion, 27-4, on February 21, 2019.

### SB 68

#### SUBSIDIES FOR GENERAL MOTORS

**(CFGF OPPOSES)**

Corporate welfare has many negative consequences. It creates more bureaucracy, more lobbyists, more government spending - all at the expense of taxpayers - and it gives legislators the power to unfairly pick winners and losers in the marketplace. Among other things, this bill would authorize up to \$50 million in tax breaks for General Motors to expand its existing assembly plant in Wentzville, MO. It also contains a disturbing earmark for one particular company in Kansas City that could cost taxpayers over \$300 million. The Missouri House passed the bill, 92-51, on May 9, 2019. The Missouri Senate passed it, 25-8, on May 13, 2019.

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### SB 174

#### CLEANING UP THE TAX CODE

##### (CFGF SUPPORTS)

This act disallows the tax credit designed to compensate for the franchise tax. Missouri's law allows a tax credit for banking institutions to compensate for franchise taxes paid. The corporate franchise tax was repealed, for tax years beginning after January 1, 2020, so ending this tax credit will clean up the state's tax code and make it more equitable. The Missouri Senate passed this bill, 33-0, on April 4, 2019. The Missouri House passed it, 129-4, on May 16, 2019.

### SB 213

#### STATE DEMOGRAPHER

##### (CFGF SUPPORTS)

The newly created government position of state demographer was established in the Missouri Constitution by initiative petition. The demographer was not subject to ethics and conflict of interest provisions, financial transparency measures, and gift bans for the

demographer and his/her family. This act ensures good governance by subjecting the demographer to these rules as well as a two-year ban on becoming a lobbyist after the demographer leaves the position. The Missouri Senate passed it, 26-7, on March 28, 2019. The Missouri House passed it, 142-3, on May 16, 2019.

### SB 275

#### UNCONSTITUTIONAL MULTI-SUBJECT BILL

##### (CFGF OPPOSES)

The original purpose of Senate Bill 275 was relating to health care, but the final version of SB 275 included a broader list of subjects. The Missouri Constitution says in Article III, Section 23 that "No bill shall contain more than one subject which shall be clearly expressed in its title." SB 275 contains more than one subject and therefore has violated the state's constitution. The Missouri House passed this bill, 120-19, on May 17, 2019. The Missouri Senate passed, 30-2, on the same day.

### SB 333

#### HIGHER LOCAL TAXES

##### (CFGF OPPOSES)

This bill doubles the maximum tax rate from 0.25% to 0.50% that certain municipalities can propose to voters to pay for fire protection services. The Missouri Senate passed this bill, 26-5, on April 18, 2019. The Missouri House passed it, 103-41, on May 17, 2019.

### SB 414

#### FEDERAL WAIVER FOR OBAMACARE

##### (CFGF SUPPORTS)

This act creates the "Missouri Health Insurance Innovation Task Force" with the purpose of soliciting concepts and making recommendations for an innovation waiver application under Obamacare. The task force would focus on improving access to health care, decreasing premiums, and increasing the number of carriers. The Missouri Senate passed this, 30-1, on April 18, 2019. The Missouri House passed it, 133-17, on May 16, 2019.

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### SCR 14

#### MORE DEBT FOR HIGHWAYS

(CFGF OPPOSES)

This resolution authorizes and directs the state to issue \$301 million in new debt not backed by dedicated revenue to pay for the construction and repair of 215 bridges in Missouri. The Missouri Senate passed this resolution, 26-7, on April 15, 2019. The Missouri House passed it, 107-31, on May 17, 2019.

### SJR 14

#### TERM LIMITS FOR STATEWIDE OFFICEHOLDERS

(CFGF SUPPORTS)

Missouri already has term limits for governor and state treasurer, but this resolution proposes that voters approve of term limits for all statewide officeholders, including lieutenant governor, secretary of state, state auditor, and the state attorney general. The Missouri Senate passed this resolution, 31-3, on April 16, 2019. The Missouri House passed it, 114-32, on May 17, 2019.

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
