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Club for Growth Foundation publishes the scorecard study so the public can monitor the actions and the voting behavior of Texas's elected state lawmakers on economic growth issues.

The Foundation conducted a comprehensive examination of each lawmaker's record on votes related to pro-growth policies and computed an Economic Growth Score on a scale of 0 to 100. A score of 100 indicates the highest support for pro-growth policies.

The Foundation examines legislative votes related to the Club's immediate pro-economic growth policy goals, including:

- Reducing or eliminating tax rates and enacting tax reform
- Limited government through limited spending and budget reform
- Regulatory reform and deregulation
- Ending abusive lawsuits through medical malpractice and tort reform
- Expanding school choice
- Implementing Term Limits

Not all of these policy goals will come up for a vote in each legislative session.

The Foundation also examines votes on bills that would directly harm these goals.

This scorecard is based on selected votes of importance to the Foundation, and does not include the complete voting record of any legislator. There are inherent limitations in judging the overall qualifications of any legislator based on a selected voting record, and the Foundation does not endorse or oppose any legislator for public office.

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LEGISLATIVE ACTIONS CONSIDERED IN TEXAS IN 2019

The Foundation’s study examined over 7,000 floor votes and, in the end, included 30 Texas House votes and 27 Texas Senate votes.

COMPUTATION

Scores are computed on a scale of 0 to 100. Each vote or action in the rating is assigned a certain number of points depending on its relative importance. If a lawmaker casts a correct vote, the scorecard will denote it with that number. If a lawmaker casts an incorrect vote, the scorecard will denote that vote with a hyphen (-). Absences are not counted – signified as an “X” on the scorecard – though the Foundation reserves the right to do so if, in its judgment, a lawmaker’s position was otherwise discernible. If a lawmaker was not officially sworn into office at the time of a vote, the scorecard will denote that vote with an “I”. Currently, the Foundation adjusts votes in the Texas Legislature if a lawmaker submits a vote statement to the respective chamber’s journal. The Foundation reserves the right to discontinue this practice in future years.

To provide some additional guidance concerning the scores, each lawmaker was ranked. Lawmakers with 0% scores are, by default, ranked #150 in the Texas House and #31 in the Texas Senate. Scores and ranks cannot be directly compared between the House and Senate, as different votes were taken in each chamber. If applicable, the study also records a “Lifetime Score” for each lawmaker. This is a simple average of the scores from 2019 and all previous years where the lawmaker earned a score.

In some cases, a lawmaker was not present for enough votes for a meaningful score or ranking to be computed. In such cases “n.a.” for not applicable appears. In computing lifetime scores, years with “n.a.” listed instead of a score are not included. Comparing such scores to other members without “n.a.” years may be misleading.

ADDITIONAL FACTORS

A study of roll call votes on the floor of the Texas House and the Texas Senate and legislative actions is just that. It cannot account for a lawmaker’s work in committee, advocacy in his party’s caucus meetings, and effectiveness as a leader in advocating pro-growth policies.

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HB 1

HUGE BUDGET INCREASE (CFGF OPPOSES)

This bill was the Fiscal Year 2020-2021 budget, which grew at a whopping 16% over the previous biennial budget. The increase in spending is well over the growth in population plus inflation - a common benchmark to track the growth in the size of government. The Texas House passed the bill, 149-0, on March 28, 2019. The Texas Senate passed it, 31-0, on April 9, 2019.

HB 234

LEMONADE STANDS (CFGF SUPPORTS)

This bill would legalize the occasional sale of lemonade by minors on private property, effectively prohibiting police from shutting down children's lemonade stands. The Texas House passed the bill, 146-1, on March 20, 2019. The Texas Senate passed it, 31-0, on May 15, 2019.

HB 852

PROHIBITING EXCESSIVE PERMIT FEES (CFGF SUPPORTS)

This bill prohibits municipalities from determining the amount of a building permit or inspection fee based on the value of the property under consideration. A pricing model such as this is an abusive use of government power. The Texas House passed this bill, 135-9, on April 15, 2019. The Texas Senate passed it, 29-2, on May 8, 2019.

HB 985

LABOR UNION CONSIDERATIONS IN PUBLIC PROJECTS (CFGF SUPPORTS)

This bill would leave the issue of labor unions out of the consideration of public project awards, thus strengthening the competitive process and preventing an uneven playing field. The Texas House passed this bill, 79-64, on April 29, 2019. The Texas Senate passed it, 19-12, on May 16, 2019.

HB 1543

OUT-OF-STATE VEHICLE TAX COLLECTION (CFGF OPPOSES)

As a method of aggressive tax collection, this bill would allow the government to bring civil action against any owner of an off-highway vehicle that was purchased out-of-state who didn't pay the state's sales tax. The Texas House passed the bill, 129-15, on April 30, 2019. The Texas Senate passed it, 29-2, on May 17, 2019.

HB 1894

DECriminalizing INTERIOR DESIGN (CFGF SUPPORTS)

Occupational licensure laws restrict innovation and job growth. It's also a prime example of regulatory capture where industry controls its own competition through the political process. This bill would repeal the criminal penalties against unlicensed interior designers. The Texas Senate passed this bill, 31-0, on May 15, 2019. The Texas House passed it, 144-1, on May 22, 2019.

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HB 2261

RURAL PHYSICIAN SUBSIDIES

(CFGF OPPOSES)

This bill would increase the amount available to the Physician Education Loan Repayment Program, which uses state tax dollars to pay for doctors' medical school loans if they practice in areas of the state that are considered "underserved". The Texas Senate passed this bill, 26-5, on May 20, 2019. The Texas House passed it, 130-11, on May 23, 2019.

HB 2402

TAX DOLLARS FOR RODEOS

(CFGF OPPOSES)

This bill would, in part, allow a private entity - the National Reined Cow Horse Association - to receive government subsidies for their championship event. The Texas House passed this bill, 119-26, on May 25, 2019. The Texas Senate passed it, 26-4, on the same day.

HB 2496

PRIVATE PROPERTY RIGHTS

(CFGF SUPPORTS)

This bill would prohibit local governments from making a historic landmark designation on private property without the property owner's consent, or a three-fourths vote of the governing local body. The Texas House passed the bill, 119-21, on April 25, 2019. The Texas Senate passed it, 25-6, on May 14, 2019.

HJR 38

CONSTITUTIONAL PROHIBITION OF AN INCOME TAX

(CFGF SUPPORTS)

While the state of Texas currently enjoys no state individual income tax, the Texas Legislature still has the authority to impose one. This resolution, if passed by the voters, would prohibit the legislature from doing so. The Texas House passed the bill, 100-42, on May 9, 2019. The Texas Senate passed it, 20-11, on May 20, 2019.

SB 2, AMDT 26

INCREASE PROPERTY TAX CAP

(CFGF OPPOSES)

The underlying bill would reduce the annual rate that property taxes can increase from 8% to

3.5%. This amendment would lower the rate to just 6% instead of 3.5%. The Texas Senate failed to pass this amendment, 13-18, on April 15, 2019.

SB 2

PROPERTY TAX REFORM

(CFGF SUPPORTS)

This bill, among other things, would reduce the annual rate that property taxes can increase from 8% to 3.5%. In addition, it would require voter approval if the adopted tax rate exceeds 3.5%. The Texas House passed the bill, 106-39, on May 1, 2019. The Texas Senate passed it, 21-9, on May 25, 2019.

SB 12

13th CHECK WITH NO REFORMS

(CFGF OPPOSES)

This bill made changes to the Teachers Retirement System (TRS) that allowed lawmakers to issue a "13th check" to retired teachers. But they failed to make structural reforms to TRS that would put it on solid financial footing. The Texas Senate passed it, 31-0, on March 25, 2019. The Texas House passed it, 145-1, on April 25, 2019.

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SB 27

PROTECTION AGAINST FRIVOLOUS REGULATORY ACTIONS

(CFGF SUPPORTS)

This bill would expand the type of civil legal cases where a party in a lawsuit against a state agency can recover attorney’s fees and expenses if the agency’s cause of action is considered frivolous or unreasonable. The Texas House passed this bill, 136-3, on May 14, 2019. The Texas Senate passed it, 31-0, on May 21, 2019.

SB 29

TAXPAYER-FUNDED LOBBYING BAN

(CFGF SUPPORTS)

This bill would enact a statewide taxpayer-funded lobbying ban that would prevent bureaucrats and lawmakers from leveraging their own power with tax dollars. The Texas Senate passed this bill, 18-13, on April 17, 2019. The bill died in the Texas House.

SB 500

RAINY DAY FUNDS SPENT

(CFGF OPPOSES)

This bill was the supplemental spending package to complete the previously enacted 2018-2019 state budget. Most of the money was spent appropriately, but billions of dollars from the Economic Stabilization Fund (ESF) were spent for several ongoing expenses - a constitutional violation of how ESF money should be spent. The Texas Senate passed this bill, 31-0, on March 13, 2019. The Texas House passed it, 149-0, on March 28, 2019.

SB 511

NEW TIRE REGULATIONS

(CFGF OPPOSES)

This bill would impose egregious new regulations on used tire shops. This anti-growth bill would be difficult to enforce and encourage litigious actors to go after used tire retailers rather than the tire manufacturers themselves. The Texas Senate passed this bill, 23-8, on April 29, 2019. The Texas House passed it, 79-64, on May 22, 2019.

SB 554

NEW REQUIREMENTS ON EMINENT DOMAIN

(CFGF SUPPORTS)

This bill strengthens private property rights by forcing stronger requirements on making “actual progress” with the property after condemnation. If progress isn’t made, the original landowner is entitled to repurchase the property. The Texas Senate passed the bill, 29-2, on March 19, 2019. The bill died in the Texas House.

SB 957

VOTER APPROVAL FOR PENSION BONDS

(CFGF SUPPORTS)

Under current law, local governments have unilateral authority to issue new debt to pay for unfunded pension liabilities. This bill would require voter approval before a municipality can issue pension bonds. The Texas Senate passed this bill, 20-10, on April 8, 2019. The bill died in the Texas House.

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SB 974

PROHIBIT PUBLIC-FUNDED POLITICAL CAMPAIGNS

(CFGF SUPPORTS)

Voters should not be forced to finance candidates they don't support. This bill would prohibit local governments from using public funds to finance political campaigns. The Texas Senate passed this bill, 27-4, on April 23, 2019. The bill died in the Texas House.

SB 1133

SCHOOL-OWNED WATER PARKS

(CFGF SUPPORTS)

This bill would ban school districts from owning or operating a water park. If public funds must be spent on education, it should be on teachers and classrooms, not water parks. The Texas Senate passed this bill, 31-0, on May 1, 2019. The bill died in the Texas House.

SB 1152

CHARGING EXTRA FOR SAME IMPACT

(CFGF SUPPORTS)

This bill would eliminate the outdated

practice where a municipality charges a telecommunications provider multiple times when the provider uses the city's right-of-way for different services, even though the impact on the right-of-way is unchanged. The Texas House passed this bill, 92-50, on May 9, 2019. The Texas Senate passed it, 28-3, on May 21, 2019.

SB 1891

TIGHTER CAP ON SPENDING

(CFGF SUPPORTS)

While Texas already has a constitutional spending limit, it is a weak one that covers less than half of the budget. This bill would strengthen the cap by limiting the growth of consolidated general revenue to population growth plus inflation. The Texas Senate passed this bill, 20-11, on April 9, 2019. The bill died in the Texas House.

SB 1995

OCCUPATIONAL LICENSING REVIEW

(CFGF SUPPORTS)

This bill would require the governor to establish an oversight division to review rules proposed by

state agencies that issue occupational licenses. Among other things, this bill would force the agencies to justify a rule and would require the oversight division to determine the rule's effect on market competition. The Texas Senate passed the bill, 25-6, on April 23, 2019. The Texas House passed it, 104-35, on May 22, 2019.

SB 2194

CORPORATE WELFARE FOR SAN BENITO

(CFGF OPPOSES)

This bill would allow the city of San Benito to develop a sports facility using the revenue from the municipal hotel occupancy tax. The Texas Senate passed this bill, 26-5, on April 23, 2019. The bill died in the Texas House.

SCR 1

10TH AMENDMENT SOVEREIGNTY

(CFGF SUPPORTS)

This resolution claims sovereignty under the 10th Amendment of the United States Constitution over all powers not enumerated to the federal government. It also calls on the federal government to halt and reverse certain

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mandates, and that certain federal legislation be prohibited or repealed. The Texas Senate passed this resolution, 19-12, on April 29, 2019. The bill died in the Texas House.

SJR 27

NO BAILOUTS FOR LOCAL RETIREMENT PLANS

(CFGF SUPPORTS)

This is a constitutional amendment that would prohibit the use of state tax dollars to pay for the obligations of a local public retirement system. The Texas Senate passed the bill, 20-10, on April 11, 2019. The bill died in the Texas House.

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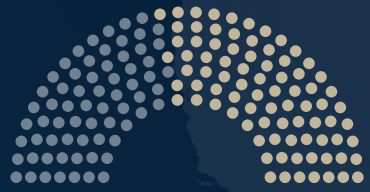

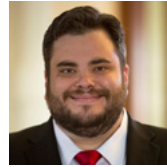

Rep. Jonathan Stickland (HD-092) | 93%



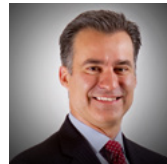

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HB 1, AMDT 72

MEDICAID EXPANSION

(CFGF OPPOSES)

This amendment (#72) would have expanded Medicaid “to the maximum extent permitted by federal law.” The Texas House failed to pass the amendment, 67-80, on March 27, 2019.

HB 1

HUGE BUDGET INCREASE

(CFGF OPPOSES)

This bill was the Fiscal Year 2020-2021 budget, which grew at a whopping 16% over the previous biennial budget. The increase in spending is well over the growth in population plus inflation - a common benchmark to track the growth in the size of government. The Texas House passed the bill, 149-0, on March 28, 2019. The Texas Senate passed it, 31-0, on April 9, 2019.

HB 10

GOVERNMENT-RUN MENTAL INSTITUTE

(CFGF OPPOSES)

This bill would spend \$100 million to create the Texas Mental and Behavioral Health Institute. It would discourage private investment while further encroaching government into the healthcare industry. The Texas House passed the bill, 114-33, on April 16, 2019. The bill died in the Texas Senate.

HB 234

LEMONADE STANDS

(CFGF SUPPORTS)

This bill would legalize the occasional sale of lemonade by minors on private property, effectively prohibiting police from shutting down children’s lemonade stands. The Texas House passed the bill, 146-1, on March 20, 2019. The Texas Senate passed it, 31-0, on May 15, 2019.

HB 288

EXPANDING MEDICAID SUBSIDIES

(CFGF OPPOSES)

This bill would increase the personal needs allowance for certain Medicaid recipients, effectively handing out cash subsidies for a program that is rife with waste, fraud, and abuse. The Texas House passed this bill, 114-29, on May 9, 2019. The bill died in the Texas Senate.

HB 787

MUSIC THERAPY LICENSURE

(CFGF OPPOSES)

Occupational licensure laws restrict innovation and job growth. It’s also a prime example of regulatory capture where industry controls its own competition through the political process. This bill creates the Advisory Council on Music Therapy - whose members include music therapists - to conduct a study on whether music therapists should be licensed and regulated.

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The Texas House passed the bill, 95-51, on April 16, 2019. The bill died in the Texas Senate.

HB 852

PROHIBITING EXCESSIVE PERMIT FEES (CFGF SUPPORTS)

This bill prohibits municipalities from determining the amount of a building permit or inspection fee based on the value of the property under consideration. A pricing model such as this is an abusive use of government power. The Texas House passed this bill, 135-9, on April 15, 2019. The Texas Senate passed it, 29-2, on May 8, 2019.

HB 985

LABOR UNION CONSIDERATIONS IN PUBLIC PROJECTS (CFGF SUPPORTS)

This bill would leave the issue of labor unions out of the consideration of public project awards, thus strengthening the competitive process and preventing an uneven playing field. The Texas House passed this bill, 80-64, on April 29, 2019. The Texas Senate passed it, 19-12, on May 16, 2019.

HB 1402

EXPANDING HOUSING SUBSIDIES (CFGF OPPOSES)

This bill would expand eligibility requirements to receive financial assistance from the Texas State Affordable Housing Corporation. In addition to low-income individuals and families receiving subsidies, the bill would expand that to include moderate-income individuals and families. The bill would also allow the agency to engage in economic development. The Texas House passed this bill, 87-60, on April 24, 2019. The bill died in the Texas Senate.

HB 1543

OUT-OF-STATE VEHICLE TAX COLLECTION (CFGF OPPOSES)

As a method of aggressive tax collection, this bill would allow the government to bring civil action against any owner of an off-highway vehicle that was purchased out-of-state who didn't pay the state's sales tax. The Texas House passed the bill, 129-15, on April 30, 2019. The Texas Senate passed it, 29-2, on May 17, 2019.

HB 1894

DECriminalIZING INTERIOR DESIGN (CFGF SUPPORTS)

Occupational licensure laws restrict innovation and job growth. It's also a prime example of regulatory capture where industry controls its own competition through the political process. This bill would repeal the criminal penalties against unlicensed interior designers. The Texas Senate passed this bill, 31-0, on May 15, 2019. The Texas House passed it, 144-1, on May 22, 2019.

HB 1968

HEALTHCARE MANDATE FOR CRANIOFACIAL ABNORMALITIES (CFGF OPPOSES)

When lawmakers mandate insurance coverage for various medical conditions and procedures, it reduces healthcare freedom that drives up the price for everyone else. This bill would expand the mandate for plans that cover craniofacial abnormalities. The Texas House passed the bill, 121-26, on May 7, 2019. The bill died in the Texas Senate.

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HB 2101

REGULATING ROOFING CONTRACTORS (CFGF OPPOSES)

This bill would aggressively regulate roofing contractors, allowing the government to create a statewide database of roofers, requiring them to both register with the state and to pay initial and annual fees. The Texas House failed to pass this bill, 30-104, on May 9, 2019.

HB 2129

TAX ABATEMENT CRONYISM (CFGF OPPOSES)

This bill would reauthorize so-called Chapter 313 tax abatements, which school districts use as corporate welfare handouts to local businesses using state tax dollars. Ironically, the platforms for both the Texas Republican Party and the Texas Democrat Party oppose this practice. The Texas House passed this bill, 115-30, on April 9, 2019. The bill died in the Texas Senate.

HB 2261

RURAL PHYSICIAN SUBSIDIES (CFGF OPPOSES)

This bill would increase the amount available to the Physician Education Loan Repayment Program, which uses state tax dollars to pay for doctors' medical school loans if they practice in areas of the state that are considered "underserved". The Texas Senate passed this bill, 26-5, on May 20, 2019. The Texas House passed it, 130-11, on May 23, 2019.

HB 2402

TAX DOLLARS FOR RODEOS (CFGF OPPOSES)

This bill would, in part, allow a private entity - the National Reined Cow Horse Association - to receive government subsidies for their championship event. The Texas House passed this bill, 119-26, on May 25, 2019. The Texas Senate passed it, 26-4, on the same day.

HB 2464

MASSAGE STUDENT LICENSURE (CFGF OPPOSES)

This bill would add another level of licensing by forcing massage school students to purchase a permit before the student can provide massage therapy services, for which they cannot receive compensation. The Texas House passed this bill, 85-60, on April 24, 2019. The bill died in the Texas Senate.

HB 2496

PRIVATE PROPERTY RIGHTS (CFGF SUPPORTS)

This bill would prohibit local governments from making a historic landmark designation on private property without the property owner's consent, or a three-fourths vote of the governing local body. The Texas House passed the bill, 121-21, on April 25, 2019. The Texas Senate passed it, 25-6, on May 14, 2019.

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HB 2806

CORPORATE WELFARE FOR MUSIC FESTIVALS

(CFGF OPPOSES)

This bill would create the Texas Music Incubator Rebate Program that would subsidize small music festivals and venues at the exclusion of larger events. It's another example of government picking winners and losers in the marketplace. The Texas House passed this bill, 105-40, on April 23, 2019. The bill died in the Texas Senate.

HB 2872

TAX HIKE ON CAR RENTALS

(CFGF OPPOSES)

This bill would require car owners to pay the state excise tax when they rent out their car using peer-to-peer car-sharing platforms or other similar markets. The Texas House passed this bill, 127-20, on May 8, 2019. The bill died in the Texas Senate.

HJR 38

CONSTITUTIONAL PROHIBITION OF AN INCOME TAX

(CFGF SUPPORTS)

While the state of Texas currently enjoys no state individual income tax, the Texas Legislature still has the authority to impose one. This resolution, if passed by the voters, would prohibit the legislature from doing so. The Texas House passed the bill, 100-42, on May 9, 2019. The Texas Senate passed it, 20-11, on May 20, 2019.

HR 4, AMDT 3

TERM LIMITS

(CFGF SUPPORTS)

This amendment (#3) would enact term limits equal to three legislatures for both Speaker of the House and Committee Chairs. The Texas House failed to pass this amendment, 11-128, on January 9, 2019.

SB 2

PROPERTY TAX REFORM

(CFGF SUPPORTS)

This bill, among other things, would reduce the annual rate that property taxes can increase from 8% to 3.5%. In addition, it would require voter approval if the adopted tax rate exceeds 3.5%. The Texas House passed the bill, 106-39, on May 1, 2019. The Texas Senate passed it, 21-9, on May 25, 2019.

SB 12

13th CHECK WITH NO REFORMS

(CFGF OPPOSES)

This bill made changes to the Teachers Retirement System (TRS) that allowed lawmakers to issue a "13th check" to retired teachers. But they failed to make structural reforms to TRS that would put it on solid financial footing. The Texas Senate passed it, 31-0, on March 25, 2019. The Texas House passed it, 145-1, on April 25, 2019.

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SB 27

PROTECTION AGAINST FRIVOLOUS REGULATORY ACTIONS

(CFGF SUPPORTS)

This bill would expand the type of civil legal cases where a party in a lawsuit against a state agency can recover attorney's fees and expenses if the agency's cause of action is considered frivolous or unreasonable. The Texas House passed this bill, 136-3, on May 14, 2019. The Texas Senate passed it, 31-0, on May 21, 2019.

SB 29, AMDT 1

RESTRICT TAXPAYER-FUNDED LOBBYING BAN

(CFGF OPPOSES)

This amendment - an attempt to dramatically weaken the bill - would restrict the proposed statewide taxpayer-funded lobbying ban contained in the underlying bill to just counties with 250,000 or more people. The Texas House passed the amendment, 82-61, on May 20, 2019.

SB 500

RAINY DAY FUNDS SPENT

(CFGF OPPOSES)

This bill was the supplemental spending package to complete the previously enacted 2018-2019 state budget. Most of the money was spent appropriately, but billions of dollars from the Economic Stabilization Fund (ESF) were spent for several ongoing expenses - a constitutional violation of how ESF money should be spent. The Texas Senate passed this bill, 31-0, on March 13, 2019. The Texas House passed it, 149-0, on March 28, 2019.

SB 511

NEW TIRE REGULATIONS

(CFGF OPPOSES)

This bill would impose egregious new regulations on used tire shops. This anti-growth bill would be difficult to enforce and encourage litigious actors to go after used tire retailers rather than the tire manufacturers themselves. The Texas Senate passed this bill, 25-6, on April 29, 2019. The Texas House passed it, 78-65, on May 22, 2019.

SB 1152

PROHIBIT CHARGING EXTRA FOR SAME IMPACT

(CFGF SUPPORTS)

This bill would eliminate the outdated practice where a municipality charges a telecommunications provider multiple times when the provider uses the city's right-of-way for different services, even though the impact on the right-of-way is unchanged. The Texas House passed this bill, 91-52, on May 9, 2019. The Texas Senate passed it, 28-3, on May 21, 2019.

SB 1995

OCCUPATIONAL LICENSING REVIEW

(CFGF SUPPORTS)

This bill would require the governor to establish an oversight division to review rules proposed by state agencies that issue occupational licenses. Among other things, this bill would force the agencies to justify the rules and would require the oversight division to determine the rule's effect on market competition. The Texas Senate passed the bill, 25-6, on April 23, 2019. The Texas House passed it, 106-37, on May 22, 2019.

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
