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Club for Growth Foundation publishes the scorecard study so the public can monitor the actions and the voting behavior of Iowa's elected state lawmakers on economic growth issues.

The Foundation conducted a comprehensive examination of each lawmaker's record on votes related to pro-growth policies and computed an Economic Growth Score on a scale of 0 to 100. A score of 100 indicates the highest support for pro-growth policies.

The Foundation examined legislative votes related to the Foundation's immediate pro-economic growth policy goals, including:

- Reducing or eliminating tax rates and enacting tax reform
- Limited government through limited spending and budget reform
- Regulatory reform and deregulation
- Ending abusive lawsuits through medical malpractice and tort reform
- Expanding school choice
- Implementing Term Limits

Not all of these policy goals will come up for a vote in each legislative session.

The Foundation also examined votes on bills that would directly harm these goals.

This scorecard is based on selected votes of importance to the Foundation, and does not include the complete voting record of any legislator. There are inherent limitations in judging the overall qualifications of any legislator based on a selected voting record, and the Foundation does not endorse or oppose any legislator for public office.

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2021 LEGISLATIVE ACTIONS CONSIDERED IN IOWA

The Foundation’s study examined over 600 floor votes and, in the end, included 17 Iowa House votes and 14 Iowa Senate votes.

COMPUTATION

Scores are computed on a scale of 0 to 100. Each vote or action in the rating is assigned a certain number of points depending on its relative importance. If a lawmaker casts a correct vote, the scorecard will denote it with that number. If a lawmaker casts an incorrect vote, the scorecard will denote that vote with a hyphen (-). Absences are not counted – signified as an “X” on the scorecard – though the Foundation reserves the right to do so if, in its judgment, a lawmaker’s position was otherwise discernible. If a lawmaker was not officially sworn into office at the time of a vote, the scorecard will denote that vote with an “I”.

To provide some additional guidance concerning the scores, each lawmaker was ranked. Aside from ties, lawmakers with 0% scores are, by default, ranked #99 in the House

and #33 in the Senate if all lawmakers are present. Scores and ranks cannot be directly compared between the House and Senate, as different votes were taken in each chamber. If applicable, the study also records a “Lifetime Score” for each lawmaker. This is a simple average of the scores from 2021 and all previous years where the lawmaker earned a score.

In some cases, a lawmaker was not present for enough votes for a meaningful score or ranking to be computed. In such cases “n.a.” for “not applicable” appears. In computing lifetime scores, years with “n.a.” listed instead of a score are not included. Comparing such scores to other members without “n.a.” years may be misleading.

ADDITIONAL FACTORS

A study of roll call votes on the floor of the Iowa House and Iowa Senate and legislative actions is just that. It cannot account for a lawmaker’s work in committee, advocacy in his party’s caucus meetings, and effectiveness as a leader in advocating pro-growth policies.

SUBSIDIES FOR HEALTHCARE WORKERS (CFGF OPPOSES)

This bill expands a rural healthcare worker loan repayment program, which subsidizes healthcare professionals who practice in rural areas, to include athletic trainers and occupational therapists. Government should not be in the business of favoring certain types of occupations over others. In addition, taxpayers should not bear this expense since it is not a core function of government. The Iowa House passed the bill, 92-0, on April 20, 2021. The Iowa Senate passed it, 47-0, on April 6, 2021.

HF 285

CRIMINALIZING UNLICENSED MUSIC THERAPISTS (CFGF OPPOSES)

This bill requires that any individual, who professes himself as a music therapist, hold a specific credential granted by the Certification

Board for Music Therapists. It also provides specific confinement and fines to be levied as punishment against those who knowingly violate this requirement. This is not a core function of government, and licensing schemes such as this stifle economic growth by imposing barriers on those seeking employment and reduce competition. Furthermore, the possibility of sentencing someone to confinement for being an uncredentialed music therapist is excessive and a vast overreach of government authority. The Iowa House passed the bill, 89-4, on February 16, 2021. The Iowa Senate passed the bill, 44-4, on April 28, 2021.

HF 555

BAN ON LOCAL REGULATIONS ON NATURAL GAS AND PROPANE (CFGF SUPPORTS)

This bill prohibits municipalities from enacting any code or ordinance that regulates or prohibits the sale or purchase of natural gas and propane.

Individuals and businesses should have the freedom to make their own energy decisions, without government interference. The Iowa House passed the bill, 57-36, on March 15, 2021. The Iowa Senate passed the bill, 29-16, on March 29, 2021.

HF 583

ALLOWANCE OF PRIVATE FLOOD INSURANCE (CFGF SUPPORTS)

This bill will encourage a private flood insurance market in Iowa. By providing an alternative to the National Flood Insurance Program, which is managed by the federal government, this pro-growth reform is allowing the private sector to deliver more services to Iowans, increasing competition, and expanding economic freedom. The Iowa House passed the bill, 94-0, on March 25, 2021. The Iowa Senate passed the bill, 44-0, on April 7, 2021.

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HF 588

HERBERT HOOVER LIBRARY SUBSIDIES

(CFGF OPPOSES)

This bill creates a new tax credit for the Hoover Presidential Library and Museum for donors contributing to its Renovation Fund. Instances of cronyism like this, where the government picks winners and losers, allow politically-connected organizations to receive benefits backed by taxpayer money. Tax schemes such as this should be abandoned in favor of tax cuts that benefit all citizens. The Iowa House passed the bill, 87-3, on April 6, 2021. The Iowa Senate passed the bill, 46-0, on April 21, 2021.

HF 802

BAN ON CRITICAL RACE THEORY

(CFGF SUPPORTS)

This bill prohibits Iowa school districts and public colleges from teaching divisive concepts including, Critical Race Theory (CRT). CRT is a radical theory rooted in Marxism that espouses the notion that all of society is racialized and should be collectively viewed through identity

groups that are separated into oppressed and oppressors. This legislation prohibits taxpayer-funded school districts and colleges from teaching students that one race or ethnic group is inherently racist or intellectually superior to another. The Iowa House passed the bill, 53-35, on May 6, 2021. The Iowa Senate passed it, 30-18, on April 28, 2021.

SF 81

DIRECT PRIMARY CARE PROGRAM

(CFGF SUPPORTS)

A direct primary care agreement is one way that consumers can gain access to healthcare without the costly or restrictive mandates that are present in many Obamacare-regulated insurance plans. These agreements have the potential to decrease healthcare costs, and they put doctors and patients in charge of healthcare decisions. This bill would establish a pilot program to allow certain Medicaid recipients to participate in direct primary care agreements, expanding consumer choice, the quality of care, and competition, as well as

potentially saving taxpayer dollars. The Iowa Senate passed the bill, 28-17, on March 29, 2021.

SF 159

MAJOR SCHOOL CHOICE BILL

(CFGF SUPPORTS)

This school choice bill would greatly expand quality educational options in Iowa and empower parents to have more autonomy over their children's education. At a time when record numbers of students are leaving failing public schools and seeking better education options, this bill would enable parents to choose the best quality education for their children. Components of this bill include a Student First Scholarship educational savings account program for certain Iowa students, charter school expansion, increased school choice tax incentives, and making every Iowa student eligible for open enrollment. The Iowa Senate passed the bill, 26-21, on January 28, 2021.

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SF 252

PROHIBITION OF HOUSING VOUCHER MANDATE

(CFGF SUPPORTS)

Property owners should have the freedom to lease their property to whomever they choose. This bill prohibits cities and counties from usurping that freedom through increased regulations that would force landlords to accept federal housing vouchers. The Iowa House passed this bill, 56-38, on March 15, 2021. The Iowa Senate passed it, 30-17, on March 17, 2021.

SF 356

TORT REFORM FOR AGRITOURISM

(CFGF SUPPORTS)

This bill will reduce tort abuse by limiting the liability of persons involved in the business of agriculture tourism. Protecting businesses from frivolous lawsuits is vital for freedom and prosperity. The Iowa House passed this bill, 53-40, on April 27, 2021. The Iowa Senate passed it, 31-17, on May 5, 2021.

SF 389

PROGRAM INTEGRITY FOR PUBLIC ASSISTANCE

(CFGF SUPPORTS)

This bill would strengthen the integrity of public assistance programs by requiring enhanced eligibility verification for individuals who apply for programs like Medicaid and the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program, as well as real-time, ongoing monitoring of current enrollees in those programs. These changes would help to reduce the rampant fraud that pervades these programs, thereby safeguarding taxpayer dollars. The Iowa Senate passed the bill, 30-18, on February 23, 2021. The bill died in the Iowa House.

SF 487

OCCUPATIONAL LICENSING OVERSIGHT

(CFGF SUPPORTS)

Occupational licensure laws restrict innovation and job growth. They are also a prime example of regulatory capture, where industry controls its own competition through regulatory boards. This

bill would provide, for the first time, constant oversight and review of those regulatory boards and agencies that oversee occupational licensing standards in Iowa. The Iowa Senate passed the bill, 30-17, on March 17, 2021. The bill died in the Iowa House.

SF 496

PROHIBITION ON VOLUNTARY CONTRACTS

(CFGF OPPOSES)

Allowing employers and employees to enter into voluntary contracts with each other is at the heart of economic and individual freedom. This bill reduces that freedom by prohibiting employers and low-wage employees from voluntarily entering into non-compete covenants. The Iowa Senate passed this bill, 45-0, on March 29, 2021.

SF 619

BROAD-BASED TAX REFORM

(CFGF SUPPORTS)

This is a massive broad-based, pro-growth tax bill

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that includes reducing the state's top personal income tax rate from 8.53% to 6.50%, phasing out the state's inheritance tax, and eliminating the mental health levy from property taxes, among other tax changes. Ultimately, it will result in a \$1.8 billion tax cut by 2027. Providing tax relief through tax cuts and broad deductions is a far superior policy approach than creating new distortionary credits that benefit particular interest groups at the expense of taxpayers as a whole. The Iowa House passed this bill, 64-28, on May 18, 2021. The Iowa Senate passed it, 29-15, on May 17, 2021.

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HF 196

SUBSIDIES FOR HEALTHCARE WORKERS (CFGF OPPOSES)

This bill expands a rural healthcare worker loan repayment program, which subsidizes healthcare professionals who practice in rural areas, to include athletic trainers and occupational therapists. Government should not be in the business of favoring certain types of occupations over others. In addition, taxpayers should not bear this expense since it is not a core function of government. The Iowa House passed the bill, 92-0, on April 20, 2021. The Iowa Senate passed it, 47-0, on April 6, 2021.

HF 228

TERMINATION OF DIVERSITY PLANS (CFGF SUPPORTS)

This bill ends the practice of voluntary diversity plans for all public school districts across the state, allowing every Iowa student to enroll into the public school system of their choice, regardless

of what district they reside in. Particularly during a time when record numbers of students are leaving failing public schools and seeking better education options, empowering parents, not government schools, is the best way to provide a quality education. The Iowa House passed the bill, 55-37, on April 20, 2021. The Iowa Senate voted to end voluntary diversity plans earlier in the session in a larger education bill.

HF 263

PRICE CONTROL FOR INSULIN (CFGF OPPOSES)

This bill would limit a covered individual's cost for a 31-day supply of insulin to \$100. Instituting price controls on insurers results in higher premiums and decreased coverage for everyone else. Insurers should have the freedom to set policy coverage and rates without government interference. The Iowa House passed the bill, 89-2, on February 8, 2021. The bill died in the Iowa Senate.

HF 285

CRIMINALIZING UNLICENSED MUSIC THERAPISTS (CFGF OPPOSES)

This bill requires that any individual, who professes himself as a music therapist, hold a specific credential granted by the Certification Board for Music Therapists. It also provides specific confinement and fines to be levied as punishment against those who knowingly violate this requirement. This is not a core function of government, and licensing schemes such as this stifle economic growth by imposing barriers on those seeking employment and reduce competition. Furthermore, the possibility of sentencing someone to confinement for being an uncredentialed music therapist is excessive and a vast overreach of government authority. The Iowa House passed the bill, 89-4, on February 16, 2021. The Iowa Senate passed the bill, 44-4, on April 28, 2021.

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HF 294

TELEHEALTH PARITY MANDATE

(CFGF OPPOSES)

This bill would force insurers to reimburse mental healthcare professionals who treat patients with telehealth services at the same rate as those who treat patients in person. Government mandates on insurers on provider reimbursement can force higher costs on the insurer resulting in higher premiums for everyone else. Insurers should have the freedom to set policy coverage and rates without government interference. The Iowa House passed the bill, 95-1, on March 8, 2021. The bill died in the Iowa Senate.

HF 555

BAN ON LOCAL REGULATIONS ON NATURAL GAS AND PROPANE

(CFGF SUPPORTS)

This bill prohibits municipalities from enacting any code or ordinance that regulates or prohibits the sale or purchase of natural gas and propane. Individuals and businesses should have the freedom to make their own energy decisions,

without government interference. The Iowa House passed the bill, 57-36, on March 15, 2021. The Iowa Senate passed the bill, 29-16, on March 29, 2021.

HF 562

HIGHER PROPERTY TAXES

(CFGF OPPOSES)

This bill would allow emergency medical districts to increase property taxes by exceeding the existing cap for district services. Governments at all levels must learn to live within their means and conserve taxpayer resources, instead of forcing citizens to pay even higher taxes. The Iowa House passed the bill, 93-0, on February 23, 2021. The bill died in the Iowa Senate.

HF 583

ALLOWANCE OF PRIVATE FLOOD INSURANCE

(CFGF SUPPORTS)

This bill will encourage a private flood insurance market in Iowa. By providing an alternative to

the National Flood Insurance Program, which is managed by the federal government, this pro-growth reform is allowing the private sector to deliver more services to Iowans, increasing competition, and expanding economic freedom. The Iowa House passed the bill, 94-0, on March 25, 2021. The Iowa Senate passed the bill, 44-0, on April 7, 2021.

HF 588

HERBERT HOOVER LIBRARY SUBSIDIES

(CFGF OPPOSES)

This bill creates a new tax credit for the Hoover Presidential Library and Museum for donors contributing to its Renovation Fund. Instances of cronyism like this, where the government picks winners and losers, allow politically-connected organizations to receive benefits backed by taxpayer money. Tax schemes such as this should be abandoned in favor of tax cuts that benefit all citizens. The Iowa House passed the bill, 87-3, on April 6, 2021. The Iowa Senate passed the bill, 46-0, on April 21, 2021.

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HF 694

EXPANSION OF FARMER SUBSIDIES

(CFGF OPPOSES)

This bill would expand the existing Beginning Farmer Tax Credit program. The government should not be in the business of picking winners and losers by unfairly helping some farmers at the expense of other farmers and taxpayers. This type of cronyism should be abandoned in favor of tax cuts that benefit everyone. The Iowa House passed the bill, 94-1, on March 24, 2021. The bill died in the Iowa Senate.

HF 712

CHILD-CARE CONSTRUCTION SUBSIDIES

(CFGF OPPOSES)

This bill would create a tax credit program for builders and developers of child-care facilities. Allowing lawmakers and bureaucrats to pick winners and losers in the marketplace is not a core function of government. This type of cronyism should be abandoned in favor of tax cuts that benefit everyone. The Iowa House passed the bill, 87-6, on March 9, 2021. The bill died in the Iowa Senate.

HF 802

BAN ON CRITICAL RACE THEORY

(CFGF SUPPORTS)

This bill prohibits Iowa school districts and public colleges from teaching divisive concepts including, Critical Race Theory (CRT). CRT is a radical theory rooted in Marxism that espouses the notion that all of society is racialized and should be collectively viewed through identity groups that are separated into oppressed and oppressors. This legislation prohibits taxpayer-funded school districts and colleges from teaching students that one race or ethnic group is inherently racist or intellectually superior to another. The Iowa House passed the bill, 53-35, on May 6, 2021. The Iowa Senate passed it, 30-18, on April 28, 2021.

HF 813

CHARTER SCHOOL EXPANSION

(CFGF SUPPORTS)

This bill allows charter schools to be created in two distinct ways, including an option with complete independence from any public school system, and delineates how school districts

must remit funds to charter schools for students utilizing charter schools who fall within the jurisdiction of that district. Development and expansion of charter schools should be encouraged as they are an important tool in continuing to provide students and parents with better education options in the face of failing public school systems. The Iowa House passed the bill, 55-40, on March 24, 2021.

HF 847

SCHOOL CHOICE EXPANSION AND MASK MANDATE PROHIBITION

(CFGF SUPPORTS)

This bill increases educational choice by expanding tax incentives that support pro-growth parental choice in education and by allowing every student in the state to open-enroll from one public school district to another. It also prohibits a school district from instituting a mask mandate. The Iowa House passed the bill, 62-33, on March 25, 2021.

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SF 252

PROHIBITION OF HOUSING VOUCHER MANDATE

(CFGF SUPPORTS)

Property owners should have the freedom to lease their property to whomever they choose. This bill prohibits cities and counties from usurping that freedom through increased regulations that would force landlords to accept federal housing vouchers. The Iowa House passed this bill, 56-38, on March 15, 2021. The Iowa Senate passed it, 30-17, on March 17, 2021.

SF 356

TORT REFORM FOR AGRITOURISM

(CFGF SUPPORTS)

This bill will reduce tort abuse by limiting the liability of persons involved in the business of agriculture tourism. Protecting businesses from frivolous lawsuits is vital for freedom and prosperity. The Iowa House passed this bill, 53-40, on April 27, 2021. The Iowa Senate passed it, 31-17, on May 5, 2021.

SF 619

BROAD-BASED TAX REFORM

(CFGF SUPPORTS)

This is a massive broad-based, pro-growth tax bill that includes reducing the state's top personal income tax rate from 8.53% to 6.50%, phasing out the state's inheritance tax, and eliminating the mental health levy from property taxes, among other tax changes. Ultimately, it will result in a \$1.8 billion tax cut by 2027. Providing tax relief through tax cuts and broad deductions is a far superior policy approach than creating new distortionary credits that benefit particular interest groups at the expense of taxpayers as a whole. The Iowa House passed this bill, 64-28, on May 18, 2021. The Iowa Senate passed it, 29-15, on May 17, 2021.

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
