

Missouri State Legislative Scorecard

See how Members of Missouri's General Assembly are voting on economic growth issues.

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Club for Growth Foundation publishes the scorecard study so the public can monitor the actions and the voting behavior of Missouri’s elected state lawmakers on economic growth issues.

The Foundation conducted a comprehensive examination of each lawmaker’s record on votes related to pro-growth policies and computed an Economic Growth Score on a scale of 0 to 100. A score of 100 indicates the highest support for pro-growth policies.

The Foundation examines legislative votes related to the Club’s immediate pro-economic growth policy goals, including:

- Reducing or eliminating tax rates and enacting tax reform
- Limited government through limited spending and budget reform
- Regulatory reform and deregulation
- Ending abusive lawsuits through medical malpractice and tort reform
- Expanding school choice
- Implementing term limits

Not all of these policy goals will come up for a vote in each legislative session.

The Foundation also examines votes on bills that would directly harm these goals.

This scorecard is based on selected votes of importance to the Foundation, and does not include the complete voting record of any legislator. There are inherent limitations in judging the overall qualifications of any legislator based on a selected voting record, and the Foundation does not endorse or oppose any legislator for public office.

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LEGISLATIVE ACTIONS CONSIDERED IN MISSOURI IN 2025

The Foundation’s study examined over 550 floor votes and, in the end, included 15 Missouri House votes and 13 Missouri Senate votes.

COMPUTATION

Scores are computed on a scale of 0 to 100. Each vote or action in the rating is assigned a certain number of points depending on its relative importance. If a lawmaker casts a correct vote, the scorecard will denote it with that number. If a lawmaker casts an incorrect vote, the scorecard will denote that vote with a hyphen (-). Absences are not counted – signified as an “X” on the scorecard – though the Foundation reserves the right to do so if, in its judgment, a lawmaker’s position was otherwise discernible. If a lawmaker was not officially sworn into office at the time of a vote, the scorecard will denote that vote with an “I”.

To provide some additional guidance concerning the scores, each lawmaker was ranked. Aside from ties, lawmakers with 0% scores are, by default, ranked #163 in the

House and #34 in the Senate if all lawmakers are present. Scores and ranks cannot be directly compared between the House and Senate, as different votes were taken in each chamber. If applicable, the study also records a “Lifetime Score” for each lawmaker. This is a simple average of the scores from 2025 and all previous years where the lawmaker earned a score.

In some cases, a lawmaker was not present for enough votes for a meaningful score or ranking to be computed. In such cases, “n.a.” for “not applicable” appears. In computing lifetime scores, years with “n.a.” listed instead of a score are not included. Comparing such scores to other members without “n.a.” years may be misleading.

ADDITIONAL FACTORS

A study of roll call votes on the floor of the Missouri House and Missouri Senate and legislative actions is just that. It cannot account for a lawmaker’s work in committee, advocacy in his party’s caucus meetings, and effectiveness as a leader in advocating pro-growth policies.

Missouri 2025 | Senate Vote Descriptions

HB 2

MISSED OPPORTUNITY EDUCATION APPROPRIATIONS (CFGF OPPOSES)

This bill appropriates some \$8.6 billion for the Department of Elementary and Secondary Education in the Missouri FY2026 state budget. This is a topline decrease of 1.5 percent from FY25 levels; however, that is due almost exclusively to reduced federal funds from emergency COVID spending. Missouri general fund spending increased by an enormous 17.5 percent over FY2025 levels, a historic spending increase. Specifically, the legislation includes \$500 million in new K-12 spending for the state's foundation formula, \$33.5 million in new spending to accommodate statutory requirements for meritless across-the-board minimum teacher salary increases, and an expansion of a COVID-era child care subsidy program. The Missouri House passed the bill, 135-9, on May 9, 2025. The Missouri Senate passed it, 26-8, on April 29, 2025.

HB 4

EARMARK-RIDDLED APPROPRIATIONS PACKAGE (CFGF OPPOSES)

This bill appropriates some \$4.8 billion for the Department of Transportation and \$917 million for the Department of Revenue in the Missouri FY2026 state budget. This is a topline increase of 3 percent from FY25 levels in transportation expenditures. Specifically, the legislation includes over \$140 million in federal and state transit subsidies, \$30 million for a Springfield convention center, \$20 million for a Jefferson City parking garage, and \$3 million for a four-lane bridge in Eureka. As hardworking families and workers face persistent inflation due to profligate spending policies in Washington D.C., state lawmakers should refrain from heaping additional spending burdens through crony earmarks to well-connected interests. The Missouri House passed the bill, 139-6, on May 9, 2025. The Missouri Senate passed it, 26-8, on April 29, 2025.

HB 11

MASSIVE MEDICAID APPROPRIATIONS PACKAGE (CFGF OPPOSES)

This bill appropriates \$17 billion to the Department of Social Services in the Missouri FY2026 state budget. While the overall state General Fund spending for the department decreased by 5.8 percent, federal spending increased by a whopping 17.6 percent year-over-year, resulting in an overall 11.9 percent increase from FY2025 spending levels. Federal spending for the department has increased 45 percent in just three years, indicating a significant expansion of the state's MO HealthNet Division Medicaid program. The bill perpetuates the state's costly and harmful Medicaid expansion with no efforts to rein in a program that has devoured state budgets and resulted in poorer health outcomes for its recipients. The Missouri House passed the bill, 133-14, on May 9, 2025. The Missouri Senate passed it, 25-8, on April 29, 2025.

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HB 20

EXPANDING COSTLY BROADBAND BOONDOGGLES

(CFGF OPPOSES)

This bill appropriates \$2.65 billion to various departments and agencies for capital improvement projects, grants, and other expenditures in the Missouri FY2026 state budget. Specifically, the legislation includes \$190 million in Department of Economic Development expenditures for broadband infrastructure, grant dispersals, and subsidized reimbursements to providers. As Missouri families and households struggle with persistent inflation, lawmakers should cease actions that wrongly view federal funds as “free money.” These federal funds come with regulatory strings attached, drive inflation, and inevitably increase future state spending baselines to maintain the broadband infrastructure after the federal spigot runs dry. The Missouri House passed the bill, 128-3, on May 9, 2025. The Missouri Senate passed it, 26-8, on May 9, 2025.

HB 546

PROTECTING SMALL BUSINESSES (CFGF SUPPORTS)

This bill exempts certain businesses from government-imposed employer mandates like those approved under Proposition A in November 2024. Specifically, the legislation exempts seasonal businesses that operate 26 weeks or fewer out of the year and small businesses that employ 50 employees or fewer from onerous minimum wage increases and paid sick leave mandates. Minimum wage increases and employee leave mandates create significant ongoing costs for employers and place onerous constraints on small businesses in particular, leading to diminished profit margins and fewer overall jobs due to sudden spikes in mandatory wages and benefits. The Missouri Senate passed the bill, 22-11, on May 14, 2025. The Missouri House did not take it up.

HB 567

ELIMINATING ONEROUS EMPLOYER MANDATES

(CFGF SUPPORTS)

This bill repeals a burdensome regulatory mandate and curbs perpetual minimum wage increases. Specifically, the legislation fully repeals the sick leave mandate and ends the requirement for future minimum wage hikes implemented by Proposition A, which was approved by voters in 2024. These one-size-fits-all labor mandates impose significant front-end costs on employers, who must account for extensive lost labor from each employee, and back-end costs for employees who potentially lose take-home pay and individually tailored benefits to offset the cost of the government mandate. Further empirical data have consistently shown that minimum wage increases result in fewer jobs and place onerous constraints on small businesses, leading to diminished profit margins due to sudden increases in mandatory hourly wages. These costs are then passed on to consumers.

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The Missouri House passed the bill, 84-62, on March 13, 2025. The Missouri Senate passed it, 22-11, on May 14, 2025.

HB 594

CAPITAL GAINS TAX ELIMINATION

(CFGF SUPPORTS)

This bill implements significant tax reforms in Missouri. Specifically, the legislation permits individuals subject to Missouri's income tax to deduct 100 percent of capital gains for federal income tax purposes beginning January 1, 2025, and institutes a trigger for businesses stipulating that so long as the state's top income tax rate remains at 4.5 percent or lower, entities may also deduct 100 percent of capital gains the following year. Additionally, the bill implements smaller harmful provisions, such as increased local tourism taxes and crony carveouts for broadband infrastructure, which reward special interests at the expense of hardworking families. Nevertheless, estimates suggest that the capital gains exemption will reduce the individual tax burden by \$485 million through FY2030, marking a substantial

improvement in the state's tax policies and solidifying Missouri as the first state to repeal capital gain taxes. The Missouri House passed the bill, 102-41, on May 7, 2025. The Missouri Senate passed it, 27-6, on April 7, 2025.

HB 595

PROPERTY OWNER PROTECTION MEASURE

(CFGF SUPPORTS)

This bill preempts municipalities from imposing restrictions on property owners. Specifically, the legislation prohibits political subdivisions from enacting any ordinances or resolutions that bar landlords from considering sources of income when making rental or lease determinations, specifically for prospective tenants whose income includes federal housing welfare payments. This bill provides property owners with the ability to reject applicants whose income relies on Section 8 housing welfare, thereby protecting landlords from being forced to engage in financially risky lease agreements. The Missouri House passed the bill, 103-37, on May 5, 2025. The Missouri Senate passed it, 23-10, on May 7, 2025.

HB 754

MODEST SOUND MONEY PROTECTIONS

(CFGF SUPPORTS)

This bill implements numerous tax-related and sound money provisions. Specifically, the legislation exempts buying and selling gold or silver bullion from capital gains and losses, effective January 1, 2026. It also allows gold or silver bullion and electronic currency to be used to pay debts, taxes, or fees in Missouri, while prohibiting the state or its political subdivisions from seizing such assets except as already provided by law. Further, the bill prohibits the state from restricting the ability of individuals or entities to acquire specie legal tender or utilize it in transactions. While the bill implements fairly onerous regulations on virtual currency kiosk operators, the legislation facilitates measures that help ensure gold and silver can serve as an alternative competitive currency to the dollar, as well as provide taxpayers with some potential protection during a significant inflationary or hyperinflationary event. The Missouri House passed the bill, 118-10, on May 5, 2025. The Missouri Senate passed it, 32-2, on the same day.

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SB 3

CRONY SPORTS TAX CREDIT HANDOUT (CFGF OPPOSES)

This bill expands a sports and events tax credit program. Specifically, the legislation extends the existing refundable credit from \$5 per ticket sold to \$6 per ticket sold and from \$10 per registered individual to \$12 per registered individual. Furthermore, the bill doubles the existing spending cap on the program from \$3 million to \$6 million, earmarks \$5.5 million in taxpayer-funded handouts to recipients in Kansas City and St. Louis, and extends the program through 2032. Additionally, the bill creates the “Show Me Sports Investment” program, which could result in \$50 million in special interest tax credits for the development of a new or renovated sports complex for the Kansas City Chiefs, Kansas City Royals, or St. Louis Cardinals. This program is little more than a direct government-imposed wealth transfer from hardworking Missourians to large sports franchises, urban sporting event centers, and their well-connected sponsors. The Missouri House passed the bill, 90-58, on June 11, 2025. The Missouri Senate passed it, 19-13, on June 5, 2025.

SB 94

COST-DRIVING HEALTHCARE OMNIBUS (CFGF OPPOSES)

This bill implements myriad new healthcare-related policy provisions. Specifically, the legislation expands Medicaid to cover doula services, childbirth education courses, and clinical pathology services in hospitals. Further, the bill expands the state’s loan repayment program, which is subsidized by hardworking taxpayers, to incorporate any discipline designated by the department and includes a new mandate that at least 35 percent of subsidies flow to dentists and primary care physicians. There is no limiting principle to the outgrowth of the costly and fraud-prone Medicaid program if such niche medical services are foisted onto taxpayers. Additionally, it is an absolute moral failing for lawmakers to direct hard-earned tax dollars from working-class households to subsidize professions that make between four and five times the state’s median income. The Missouri Senate passed the bill, 34-0, on February 27, 2025. The Missouri House did not take it up.

SB 145

MINOR-OPERATED BUSINESS DEREGULATION (CFGF SUPPORTS)

This bill preempts political subdivisions from imposing certain business taxes. Specifically, the legislation prohibits cities and municipalities from imposing a licensing tax on any business enterprise owned by an individual who is 18 years old or younger. This is a pro-growth measure that encourages entrepreneurship and mitigates harmful obstacles to youth employment. During a time when families are struggling to make ends meet due to high costs amid persistent inflation, lawmakers should continue to develop policies that encourage pro-growth methods for bolstering household revenue. The Missouri House passed the bill, 108-21, on May 15, 2025. The Missouri Senate passed it, 33-0, on February 20, 2025.

SB 163

SIGNIFICANT INCOME TAX REDUCTION (CFGF SUPPORTS)

This bill implements substantial reductions in Missouri’s income tax rates. Specifically, the

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legislation lowers the individual income tax rate to 4.7 percent beginning January 1, 2026, and authorizes a gradual phase down over the next 10 years to 3.5 percent, assuming specific revenue metrics are met. Further, the bill lowers the corporate income tax rate from 4 percent to 3.75 percent, provides for a flat \$4,000 increase for the existing standard deduction, and repeals the state's earned income tax credit welfare match. Estimates suggest that the individual income tax reductions will provide some \$6.34 billion in relief for hardworking families over the next 10 years, along with at least \$135 million in reduced tax burdens on Missouri businesses through 2028 from the reduced corporate rate. The Missouri Senate passed it, 32-0, on February 13, 2025. The Missouri House passed it under a different bill number.

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

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HB 2

MISSED OPPORTUNITY EDUCATION APPROPRIATIONS (CFGF OPPOSES)

This bill appropriates some \$8.6 billion for the Department of Elementary and Secondary Education in the Missouri FY2026 state budget. This is a topline decrease of 1.5 percent from FY25 levels; however, that is due almost exclusively to reduced federal funds from emergency COVID spending. Missouri general fund spending increased by an enormous 17.5 percent over FY2025 levels, a historic spending increase. Specifically, the legislation includes \$500 million in new K-12 spending for the state's foundation formula, \$33.5 million in new spending to accommodate statutory requirements for meritless across-the-board minimum teacher salary increases, and an expansion of a COVID-era child care subsidy program. The Missouri House passed the bill, 135-9, on May 9, 2025. The Missouri Senate passed it, 26-8, on April 29, 2025.

HB 4

EARMARK-RIDDLED APPROPRIATIONS PACKAGE (CFGF OPPOSES)

This bill appropriates some \$4.8 billion for the Department of Transportation and \$917 million for the Department of Revenue in the Missouri FY2026 state budget. This is a topline increase of 3 percent from FY25 levels in transportation expenditures. Specifically, the legislation includes over \$140 million in federal and state transit subsidies, \$30 million for a Springfield convention center, \$20 million for a Jefferson City parking garage, and \$3 million for a four-lane bridge in Eureka. As hardworking families and workers face persistent inflation due to profligate spending policies in Washington D.C., state lawmakers should refrain from heaping additional spending burdens through crony earmarks to well-connected interests. The Missouri House passed the bill, 139-6, on May 9, 2025. The Missouri Senate passed it, 26-8, on April 29, 2025.

HB 11

MASSIVE MEDICAID APPROPRIATIONS PACKAGE (CFGF OPPOSES)

This bill appropriates \$17 billion to the Department of Social Services in the Missouri FY2026 state budget. While the overall state General Fund spending for the department decreased by 5.8 percent, federal spending increased by a whopping 17.6 percent year-over-year, resulting in an overall 11.9 percent increase from FY2025 spending levels. Federal spending for the department has increased 45 percent in just three years, indicating a significant expansion of the state's MO HealthNet Division Medicaid program. The bill perpetuates the state's costly and harmful Medicaid expansion with no efforts to rein in a program that has devoured state budgets and resulted in poorer health outcomes for its recipients. The Missouri House passed the bill, 133-14, on May 9, 2025. The Missouri Senate passed it, 25-8, on April 29, 2025.

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HB 20

EXPANDING COSTLY BROADBAND BOONDOGGLES

(CFGF OPPOSES)

This bill appropriates \$2.65 billion to various departments and agencies for capital improvement projects, grants, and other expenditures in the Missouri FY2026 state budget. Specifically, the legislation includes \$190 million in Department of Economic Development expenditures for broadband infrastructure, grant dispersals, and subsidized reimbursements to providers. As Missouri families and households struggle with persistent inflation, lawmakers should cease actions that wrongly view federal funds as “free money.” These federal funds come with regulatory strings attached, drive inflation, and inevitably increase future state spending baselines to maintain the broadband infrastructure after the federal spigot runs dry. The Missouri House passed the bill, 128-3, on May 9, 2025. The Missouri Senate passed it, 26-8, on May 9, 2025.

HB 269

MASSIVE CHILDCARE WELFARE EXPANSION

(CFGF OPPOSES)

This bill creates three new taxpayer-funded tax credit programs. Specifically, the legislation authorizes the Child Care Contribution Tax Credit equal to \$200,000 per year per taxpayer for contributing to qualified providers, an employer-provided Child Care Assistance Tax Credit, and a Child Care Providers Tax Credit in a massive \$70 million per year distortionary tax scheme that creates a new permanent state welfare program. Furthermore, depending on the employer and business, participating employers could pass on the costs of covering this new benefit to consumers and customers with commensurate employee wage reductions. The Missouri House passed the bill, 120-34, on February 27, 2025. The Missouri Senate did not take it up.

HB 567

ELIMINATING ONEROUS EMPLOYER MANDATES

(CFGF SUPPORTS)

This bill repeals a burdensome regulatory mandate and curbs perpetual minimum wage increases. Specifically, the legislation fully repeals the sick leave mandate and ends the requirement for future minimum wage hikes implemented by Proposition A, which was approved by voters in 2024. These one-size-fits-all labor mandates impose significant front-end costs on employers, who must account for extensive lost labor from each employee, and back-end costs for employees who potentially lose take-home pay and individually tailored benefits to offset the cost of the government mandate. Further empirical data have consistently shown that minimum wage increases result in fewer jobs and place onerous constraints on small businesses, leading to diminished profit margins due to sudden increases in mandatory hourly wages. These costs are then passed on to consumers. The Missouri House passed the bill, 84-62, on

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March 13, 2025. The Missouri Senate passed it, 22-11, on May 14, 2025.

HB 594

CAPITAL GAINS TAX ELIMINATION

(CFGF SUPPORTS)

This bill implements significant tax reforms in Missouri. Specifically, the legislation permits individuals subject to Missouri’s income tax to deduct 100 percent of capital gains for federal income tax purposes beginning January 1, 2025, and institutes a trigger for businesses stipulating that so long as the state’s top income tax rate remains at 4.5 percent or lower, entities may also deduct 100 percent of capital gains the following year. Additionally, the bill implements smaller harmful provisions, such as increased local tourism taxes and crony carveouts for broadband infrastructure, which reward special interests at the expense of hardworking families. Nevertheless, estimates suggest that the capital gains exemption will reduce the individual tax burden by \$485 million through FY2030, marking a substantial improvement in the state’s tax policies and solidifying Missouri as the first

state to repeal capital gain taxes. The Missouri House passed the bill, 102-41, on May 7, 2025. The Missouri Senate passed it, 27-6, on April 7, 2025.

HB 595

PROPERTY OWNER PROTECTION MEASURE

(CFGF SUPPORTS)

This bill preempts municipalities from imposing restrictions on property owners. Specifically, the legislation prohibits political subdivisions from enacting any ordinances or resolutions that bar landlords from considering sources of income when making rental or lease determinations, specifically for prospective tenants whose income includes federal housing welfare payments. This bill provides property owners with the ability to reject applicants whose income relies on Section 8 housing welfare, thereby protecting landlords from being forced to engage in financially risky lease agreements. The Missouri House passed the bill, 103-37, on May 5, 2025. The Missouri Senate passed it, 23-10, on May 7, 2025.

HB 660

TAXPAYER PROTECTION OMNIBUS

(CFGF SUPPORTS)

This bill implements numerous new tax-related and ballot measure provisions. Specifically, the legislation prohibits a political subdivision from resubmitting a failed tax proposal or tax increase for two years following ballot rejection, requires a two-thirds supermajority vote if municipalities seek to establish a new sales tax for community improvement districts, requires a two-thirds supermajority from voters to approve such a tax, and requires ballot language to clearly specify if a temporary tax would become permanent upon approval. Further, the bill ensures that short-term rentals are taxed as residential properties instead of as “transient housing,” lowering the tax rate from 32 percent to 19 percent. These measures provide additional layers of taxpayer protection for hardworking families weathering persistent inflation and burdensome tax-and-spend policies. The Missouri House passed the bill, 89-58, on March 12, 2025. The Missouri Senate did not take it up.

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HB 742

DISMANTLING TAXPAYER-FUNDED DEI INFRASTRUCTURE

(CFGF SUPPORTS)

This bill prohibits state agencies from promoting or practicing Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion (DEI) initiatives and programs. Specifically, the legislation prohibits government entities that receive taxpayer money from funding or operating woke DEI offices, trainings, and programs that promote race essentialism, as well as contracting with entities that engage in such practices. Hardworking Missourians should not be compelled to fund government bureaucracies that engage in explicit discrimination and espouse neo-Marxist concepts. The Missouri House passed the bill, 108-50, on February 20, 2025. The Missouri Senate did not take it up.

HB 754

MODEST SOUND MONEY PROTECTIONS

(CFGF SUPPORTS)

This bill implements numerous tax-related and sound money provisions. Specifically, the legislation exempts buying and selling gold

or silver bullion from capital gains and losses, effective January 1, 2026. It also allows gold or silver bullion and electronic currency to be used to pay debts, taxes, or fees in Missouri, while prohibiting the state or its political subdivisions from seizing such assets except as already provided by law. Further, the bill prohibits the state from restricting the ability of individuals or entities to acquire specie legal tender or utilize it in transactions. While the bill implements fairly onerous regulations on virtual currency kiosk operators, the legislation facilitates measures that help ensure gold and silver can serve as an alternative competitive currency to the dollar, as well as provide taxpayers with some potential protection during a significant inflationary or hyperinflationary event. The Missouri House passed the bill, 118-10, on May 5, 2025. The Missouri Senate passed it, 32-2, on the same day.

HB 798

SIGNIFICANT INCOME TAX REDUCTION

(CFGF SUPPORTS)

This bill implements substantial reductions in Missouri's income tax rates. Specifically, the

legislation lowers the individual income tax rate to 4.7 percent beginning January 1, 2026, and authorizes a gradual phase down over the next 10 years to 3.5 percent, assuming specific revenue metrics are met. Further, the bill lowers the corporate income tax rate from 4 percent to 3.75 percent, provides for a flat \$4,000 increase for the existing standard deduction, and repeals the state's earned income tax credit welfare match. Estimates suggest that the individual income tax reductions will provide some \$6.34 billion in relief for hardworking families over the next 10 years, along with at least \$135 million in reduced tax burdens on Missouri businesses through 2028 from the reduced corporate rate. The Missouri House passed the bill, 100-53, on March 12, 2025. The Missouri Senate passed it under a different bill number.

HB 1524

CRONY SPECIAL INTEREST DISTRICTS

(CFGF OPPOSES)

This bill authorizes the creation of special entertainment districts in cities. Specifically, the legislation carves out areas that are at least 100

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acres and utilized for enumerated entertainment purposes for designation as “entertainment districts.” These districts are not subject to the 50 percent property owner approval threshold that community improvement districts require. Further, the bill authorizes state agencies and proposed districts to enact 27-year funding agreements allowing for up to \$2.5 million per year in subsidized appropriations through 2031 and \$4.5 million annually in the following years. These agreements bypass existing property owner safeguards found in other special district carveouts and reward well-connected interests with government-preferred handouts at the expense of hardworking families. The Missouri House passed the bill, 121-32, on April 10, 2025. The Missouri Senate did not take it up.

SB 3

CRONY SPORTS TAX CREDIT HANDOUT

(CFGF OPPOSES)

This bill expands a sports and events tax credit program. Specifically, the legislation extends the existing refundable credit from \$5 per ticket sold to \$6 per ticket sold and from \$10 per registered

individual to \$12 per registered individual. Furthermore, the bill doubles the existing spending cap on the program from \$3 million to \$6 million, earmarks \$5.5 million in taxpayer-funded handouts to recipients in Kansas City and St. Louis, and extends the program through 2032. Additionally, the bill creates the “Show Me Sports Investment” program, which could result in \$50 million in special interest tax credits for the development of a new or renovated sports complex for the Kansas City Chiefs, Kansas City Royals, or St. Louis Cardinals. This program is little more than a direct government-imposed wealth transfer from hardworking Missourians to large sports franchises, urban sporting event centers, and their well-connected sponsors. The Missouri House passed the bill, 90-58, on June 11, 2025. The Missouri Senate passed it, 19-13, on June 5, 2025.

SB 145

MINOR-OPERATED BUSINESS

DEREGULATION

(CFGF SUPPORTS)

This bill preempts political subdivisions from

imposing certain business taxes. Specifically, the legislation prohibits cities and municipalities from imposing a licensing tax on any business enterprise owned by an individual who is 18 years old or younger. This is a pro-growth measure that encourages entrepreneurship and mitigates harmful obstacles to youth employment. During a time when families are struggling to make ends meet due to high costs amid persistent inflation, lawmakers should continue to develop policies that encourage pro-growth methods for bolstering household revenue. The Missouri House passed the bill, 108-21, on May 15, 2025. The Missouri Senate passed it, 33-0, on February 20, 2025.

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
